BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.-Rub with a Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace

Make Leather Waterproof.—Saturate it with castor oil; to stop shoes of the sole

Clean the Hair.-Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda ounce; cream tartar 1/4 ounce. Egg Stains on Spoons.-Rub with

hands in clear water, dry slightly and while still moist strike a sulphur match and hold your hands around the

Clean Gloves .- Pour a little benzine into a basin and wash the gloves in it, rubbing and squeezing them unth clean. If much soiled, they must be washed again through clean bentine and rinsed in a fresh supply.

Hang in the air to dry. Clean Hair brushes.—Dissolve a lit-tle soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of amonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and

put in the air to dry.

Remove Stains from Linen.— Wet
the part stained and lay on it some salt of wormwood; then rub without diluting it with more water. How to Remove a Rusty Screw


