

## TWO FISH RECIPES.

## Fish Chowder.

2 ounces haddock or cod, 1 slice of salt pork, half an onion, 4 potatoes, 2 pints water, 2 pints hot milk, 1 tablespoon oleo, 6 crackers, salt and pepper.

Put head, skin, bones and fish into kettle with cold water and allow to come slowly to boiling point. Cook a half-hour. Strain water, reserving fish for scalloped fish, and return to kettle. Cut pork into small pieces and fry with onion till brown and add to fish stock; add potatoes, washed, pared and diced; cook until potatoes are soft. Add hot milk, oleo, seasoning and crackers.

## Scalloped Fish.

Fish, 2 cups milk, salt, pepper, celery salt, paprika, 2 tablespoons oleo (or a little less of butter), 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1 cup bread crumbs. Make cream sauce of milk, oleo, cornstarch and seasoning. Add fish; place in greased baking dish, cover with crumbs. Dot top with butter and bake until brown.

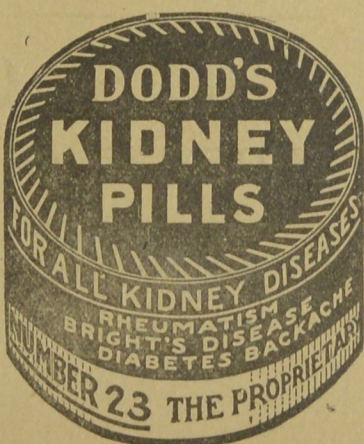

IN EMPTY ROOMS

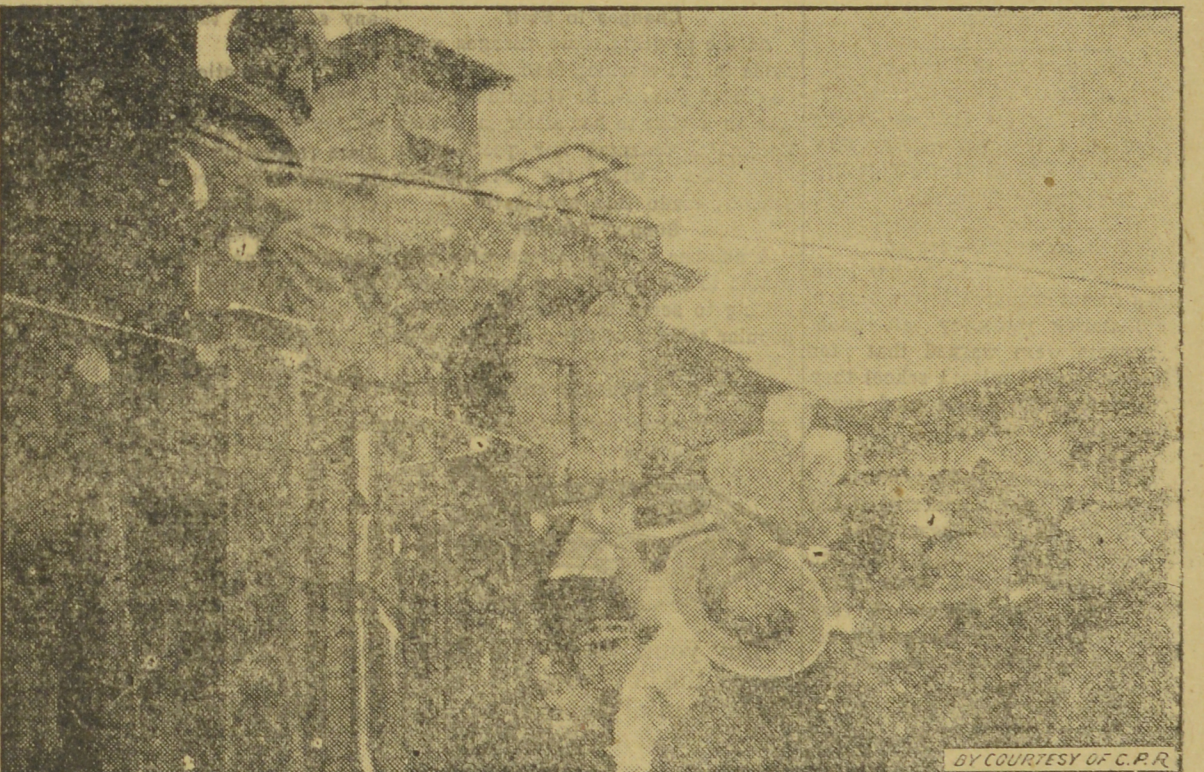
