FOR SOLDIERS' CHILDREN.

Pensions for children of deceased and totally disabled soldiers have been increased and classified.

Under the new rates children of deceased members of the force will be entitled to allowances as follows:

1. First child or younger brother or sister, \$12 a month.
2. Second child or younger brother or sister, \$10 a month.
3. Third and subsequent children or younger brothers or sisters, \$8 per month.
4. First orphan child or younger brother or sister, \$24 per month.
5. Second orphan child or younger brother as sister, \$20 per month.
6. Third and subsequent orphan children or younger brothers or sisters, \$16 per month.

Previously there had been a straight allowance of \$8 a month per child in the case of children whose mothers are still living. In the case of orphan children, there was a straight allowance of \$16 per month.

The children of disabled members of the forces up to the rank of major (militia) or lieutenant commander (naval) will now be entitled, when the member of the force is entitled to a total disability pension, to the following allowances:

1. First child, \$12 per month.
2. Second child, \$10 a month.
3. Third and subsequent children \$8 a month.

Previously, under this heading there had been a straight allowance of \$8 per month for each child.

When the disabled pensioner is pensioned for less than a total disability, the allowance for his children will be graded from class to class, according to the schedule to be prepared by the Board of Pension Commissioners. The increases are payable as from Sept. 1st, 1918.

PROHIBITION AND TEA.

The marked increase in the importation of tea into the United States lends interest to a statement made by a British tea grower, that world consumption of tea is now exceeding production by reason of the reduced consumption of alcoholic liquors in many of the principal countries of the world. Prohibition, he said, is so increasing the consumption of tea that the world demand, especially after the reopening of Russia, "must far exceed any possible production for some years to come."

Whether legislation of this character in the United States has or has not affected the consumption of tea, it is at least a fact that the tea imports into the United States are now far in excess of any preceding year. A compilation by the National City Bank of New York shows that the quantity of tea imported into the United States in the fiscal year 1918 was 151,000,000 lbs., against 103,000,000 lbs. in the immediately preceding year. And 115,000,000 in the high record year 1909. The value of the imports of the fiscal year 1918 is also 50 per cent. greater than in any earlier year, aggregating \$31,000,000 in value, against an average of about \$18,000,000 per annum in the preceding five years.

Fredericton's share of the above account was settled at \$2,125.50.

In reply to Coun. Pat Graham Solicitor Richards said he could not estimate what he would charge for preparing the bylaws for presentation to the council.

Cattle on Island Land

Coun. Fox asked if owners of island land had a right to pasture cattle owned by others on their own land.

Solicitor Richards gave the opinion that they could do so.

Coun. Everett said that the point had arisen through the Jewish cattle-dealers turning cattle on the islands with no regard to the acreage or number of head. The result was that one Jew had ninety head on the islands last autumn.

It was to prevent people like him getting complete control of the islands that the pound-keepers had become active.

Coun. Fox suggested that the pound-keepers should have lists of all island owners their acreage, their cattle-marks and number of head of cattle.

Junk Dealers' Licenses

Coun. Pat Graham asked if anything was being done about collecting junk-dealers' license fees. In his section of the county junk dealers never had been so numerous yet he saw no record of receipt of license-fees. He believed any constable should be empowered to approach any junk-dealers. Personally he did not know if he had the right.

Solicitor Richards said any councillor or any citizen should enforce law.

Coun. Nason said he had approached a Jewish junk-dealer in his own parish and found he had no license.

Coun. Cowperthwaite wanted no appointment of officials to collect junk-dealers' fees. The cost would be more than receipts. His own view was that in collecting old metal from the rural districts the junk-dealers were benefiting the community as such material after being collected was going into manufacture. Otherwise it would rust away without value to any person.

A vote of thanks was extended to Warden Hallett, coupled with the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow". The Warden replied thanking the Councillors for their assistance.

The council then adjourned sine die.
