SIR ROBERT L. BORDEN IS IN DELICATE HEALTH

Premier Has Not Yet Recovered From Injuries Received While Welcoming the Prince of Wales at Halifax—Has Been Under a Heavy Strain for Some Years and May Have to Take a Rest.

Ottawa, Sept. 22.—Sir Robert Borden will remain confined to his house for three or four days at least. He had recovered sufficiently from his illness to be up and about the house towards the end of last week, but over the week-end there was a relapse and he is back in bed again today. His condition has taken a disagreeable form in that it has descended to his legs, causing an inflammation of the joints serious enough to make it necessary for him to rest in bed although nothing to cause his friends great concern. It is believed that the wrench Sir Robert's leg received when he went to Halifax to welcome the Prince of Wales to Canada left a condition which his illness aggravates. The leg has never entirely recovered since then, and the premier may have used it too soon.

The premier has been under continued strain for many years, and his opportunities of relaxing from the tension he has been under have been comparatively few. It is not likely that he will spend much time at parliament during the present session. He will be there if his presence is absolutely necessary but it is understood that medical advice is that he should go away for a period of entire relaxation. On account of the inflammation in his joints, it is quite possible that he will go to some southern hot springs for rest and treatment. His friends state that there is no reason to believe otherwise than that after a short holiday he will be as fit as ever and resume his place as the active head of the government of the country.

There are prophets in Ottawa, who say that Sir Robert will retire from the premiership of Canada very soon. There are no immediate signs of it, and most of these stories have their genesis in the well known fact that he was sorely tempted to resign last spring to become British ambassador at Washington and in the fact that he

himself makes no secret of his desire to retire if it can be honorably accomplished. Last spring, he did not retire because it was pointed out to him that his leadership was considered still essential to the continuance of Unionist government and that it would be difficult to find someone who could hold the diverse elements together. Sir Thomas White's name was mentioned, but he likewise joined the solicitations of those who wanted the premier to stay at the head of affairs. He has done so, but this feeling about the matter remains the same. He will not retire under fire, and he does not want to do so until there seems an excellent prospect of unanimity in the choice of his successor. Some talk there is of his going to the league of nations to represent Canada, but it is doubtful if Canada will have special representation on the chief executive committee where the "Big Five" will each have a representative and where the powers including the dominions may have to delegate their representation.

Sir Robert, however, is a wealthy man with many and varied interests, with his books, his affairs, his hobbies and his friends he would have no trouble in disposing of his time in case of retirement and the question of having some position fitting for a retiring premier would probably not weigh with him. He has had much honor, and to remain premier can bring him no more. It is hard work, and he knows of pleasure. He would like to quit if it would be permitted, and if he could quit without being a "quitter."

A government caucus has been called for tomorrow morning to discuss the situation arising out of the premier's continued illness.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane's Death

Tribute to the late Hon. Frank Cochrane was paid in the house this afternoon. Hon. C. J. Doherty, referred to Mr. Cochrane as a man of sturdy reputation, one who in every action was inspired by a desire to do his duty and do it in full measure.

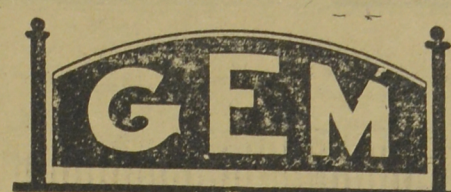
Mr. McKenzie, house leader of the opposition also expressed the profound regret of the opposition. PREMIER FOSTER FORMALLY OPENS CHATHAM FAIR

Chatham, Sept. 22.—There was a very good attendance at the opening of the Chatham Exhibition here tonight. Sharply at 8 o'clock George Watt, president of the Miramichi Agricultural Exhibition Association, addressed a few opening remarks and introduced the following speakers, who addressed the large number assembled in the order named: His Worship Mayor Goymor, Hon. W. E. Foster, Premier of the province, Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works; Hon. E. A. Smith, Minister of Lands and Mines; Hon. C. W. Robinson and F. J. Sweeney, M. P. P.

Premier Foster in his opening remarks said that it was the first time he had the honor of addressing a Chatham audience, but it was not the first time he had enjoyed the hospitality of the citizens of the North Shore town, as on several occasions before he became Premier of the province he had spent several weeks here. He thanked the committee for giving him this opportunity to address the people of Chatham and he congratulated the management on the apparent success of their efforts in having such a magnificent exhibit of agricultural and industrial products of the province. He said he found the exhibition building and grounds admirably suited for an affair of this nature and would always consider it a pleasure to give his support to any grant that the government might be asked for in future in this connection. The Premier paid a glowing tribute to the farmers of New Brunswick for the splendid efforts they had made and the success achieved during the stress of the war period. In closing he formally declared the Exhibition opened.

All the other speakers spoke along the same lines and declared the Chatham Exhibition of 1919 to be the premier one of the province.
