## GOVERNOR'S MEDAL TO MISS DOROTHY COX

VERY REV. DEAN CARNEY MADE PRESENTATION

Pointed Out Value of Education in Able Address—Miss Margaret Fowler was Second.

The Presentation of the Lieutenant Governor's Medal to Miss Dorothy Cox daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Phillip Cox, the winner of the High School Entrance Examination competition in York County was made this morning at the High School by Very Rev. Dean Carney with a very appropriate address.

The classes gathered in the Assembly Hall at 11.30 o'clock and the meeting opened with the singing of a Christmas Anthem under the direction of Prof. Frank Harrison. Dr. G. C. Van Wart chairman of the School Board was the first speaker. He referred to the examinations in which the medal was won and stated that the medal was awarded on the decision of the Chief Superintendent of Education which was final.

### Presentation Address

Next followed the presentation by Very Rev. Dean Carney with a fitting address which in part was as follows:

"It affords me great pleasure to make this presentation on so auspicious an occasion. The Province of New Brunswick has had a succession of Governors who have in every way possible encouraged education. They were all men who had considerable educational attainments and who appreciated the value of education. In order to encourage others to obtain education and obtain marks in the world they felt it necessary to have a medal awarded from year to year for the highest standing in the competitive High School Entrance Examinations for York County. In doing so the governors felt that Education was a very necessary and important factor. In the history of the world it was a necessary factor and today it was even more so. Too many people think that men and women can gain their marks in this world without education. It is true in exceptional cases but it is so because of the fact that these men and women have had wonderful gifts from the Great Creator. It is a great danger to young men and women to neglect their education.

## COOPERATIVE SOCIETY HELD AN OPEN MEETING

DIRECTORS FOR SOCIETY'S STORE WERE SELECTED

Edward Barry and T. D. Williams of This City Spoke—L. R. Hollett of Moncton Heard.

The Fredericton Cooperative Society held a public meeting last night at the Opera House in the interests of the store which the society will open in this city in the near future. On account of other meetings and the low temperature the attendance was not large. Interesting addresses were delivered by Edward Barry and T. D. Williams of this city and L. R. Hollett, manager for the store of the Moncton Cooperative Society. After the public meeting there was a private session of the society at which a provisional board of directors was elected.

### Interesting Addresses

Mr. Barry in his remarks stated that the projected cooperative store would be a fact within a short time, all that remained to do being to elect a provisional directorate. He gave a brief description of the system of profits-sharing under which a patron would receive profits in direct proportion to his expenditure at the store.

Mr. Williams confined his remarks to an historical sketch of the development of the co-operative movement in England and in Canada.

Mr. Hollett dealt with the experiences of the co-operative store in Moncton and claimed that after some difficulties which had been encountered and overcome the store was on a sound basis with a steadily expanding trade. He advised that all who would subscribe to the Fredericton store determine to stick by it for at least a year in spite of anything which might happen.

This was followed by the presentation of the Medal in which Very Rev. Dean Carney extended his congratulations to the winner.

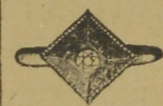
