WANTS GENERAL AMNESTY FOR CANADIAN SOLDIERS

Col. Currie Brings an Important Matter to the Attention of Parliament—Canadians Who Committed Military Offences in England Should be Leniently Dealt With—May Demand a Civic Trial in Canada for Offenders.

Ottawa, Sept. 28—The rights of Canadian soldiers imprisoned in England as a result of the Rhyll, Seaford, Witley and other riots will, in all probability make the chief topic of discussion when the House discussed Colonel Currie's motion that "A general amnesty should be granted to soldiers undergoing terms of imprisonment for military offences committed during the war." In addition to those imprisoned as a result of the riots there are cases of soldiers imprisoned since the armistice for minor breaches of discipline, which would deserve severe punishment if committed in the face of the enemy, but which it is stated, would seem rather trivial in civil life. There are others, charged with more serious crimes but who, nevertheless did good service while actual fighting was going on.

Sir Edward Kemp lately made a statement to the effect that at the end of this year he hopes there will be no Canadian military prisoners in England. Some Canadian soldiers here state that Australia insisted that every Australian prisoner should be offered the right to a civil trial in Australia if he were displeased with the martial decision. A similar demand may be made here before long.

Premier Out Again

Sir Robert Borden made his first appearance at a cabinet meeting Saturday. He was not looking very well, and he will need a rest away from Ottawa and his cares in order to recover his health completely. He will be at the caucus of the Government supporters Tuesday unless his condition suffers a setback. There the reconstruction program will be stated and Western and Eastern, Liberal and Conservative will have out their say as to whether it goes far enough, too far, or neither.

Ottawa, Sept. 28—Sir Robert Borden's attendance at cabinet council on Saturday and the intimation that the cabinet considered matters relating to government policy has heightened the interest in the Unionist caucus to be held this week previous to the departure of the Prime Minister from the capital for the rest necessitated by his illness. There was no official announcement subsequent to the cabinet meeting on Saturday and it is not regarded as likely that there will be before the caucus at which it is expected a comprehensive speech will be made by the Prime Minister.

Subsequent to the caucus there will in all probability be issued a statement that will constitute a declaration of policy, or platform for the Unionist party. In government circles it is

thought that this should be done in view of the approaching bye-elections the voting in connection with which will take place on October 27. If the caucus meets on Tuesday as expected the Prime Minister will leave the capital on Wednesday or Thursday and he is not expected to return until after the close of the session. Present expectations are that the house will not be sitting after the middle of October and it is quite possible that prorogation will take place before Thanksgiving Day, which falls on Monday, October 13, Saturday, October 11, is quite a favorable guess for the closing of the house.

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, is leaving Ottawa for Summerside, P. E. I., where he will probably speak at the opening of the Prince county campaign, on October 1. On the following evening it is expected that Mr. King will address a gathering of Prince county Liberals, when he will formally accept the nomination for Prince. He will return to Ottawa by about the first of next week.

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD

In All About 400 Delegates Have Been Placed—Committees at Work have met with Hearty Response.

Preparations for the Maritime Synod Convention of the Presbyterian Church are under way at St. Paul's Church in this city and it has been learned that nearly four hundred delegates will be quartered here for the meetings which will be held on Oct. 7th, 8th and 9th.

Much trouble was expected in quartering the four hundred delegates among the members of the congregation but owing to the work of those in charge no trouble has been encountered and the task of quartering the four hundred or so delegates has met with success. The first of the delegates it is expected will arrive here on Monday. A special train bearing many of them will arrive in this city on Tuesday. Arrangements have been made for the younger boys of the Church to take their part in the work by guiding the delegates to their various quarters on their arrival in this city.

Those attending the Synod meeting include both pastors and elders and among them are many well known and prominent members of the Presbyterian Churches in the Eastern Provinces. All the committees at work have met with a hearty response from the members of the congregation and the meeting is looked forward to with great interest.

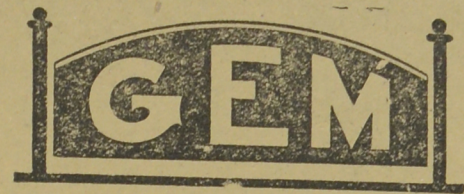
