

SEASONABLE RECIPES.

Corn Puffs.

Beat together 2½ cupfuls of milk and the yolks of two eggs, until thoroughly blended. Add two cupfuls of flour and one cupful of best cornmeal. Beat the batter thoroughly; stir in lightly the whites of the eggs beaten to a stiff froth; turn into heated irons and bake.

Corn Dodgers.

Scald one cupful of best cornmeal into which a tablespoonful of sugar has been sifted, with one cup of boiling milk. Beat until smooth and drop on a griddle in cakes about one inch in thickness, and bake slowly for an hour. Turn when brown. If preferred, the baking may be finished in the oven after the first turning.

Hominy Gems.

Beat one egg until very light, add to it one tablespoonful of thick sweet cream, little salt, if desired, and two cupfuls of cooked hominy. Thin the mixture with one cupful or less of boiling water until it will form easily, beat well and bake in heated irons.

Cream Corn Cakes.

Into one cup of thin cream stir one and one-half cups of granular cornmeal or enough to make a stiff batter; add one-third of a teaspoonful of salt; beat well, drop into heated irons and bake.

Cream Graham Rolls.

To one-half cup of cold cream add one-half cup of soft ice water. Make into a dough with three cups of graham flour, sprinkling in slowly with the hands, beating at the same time, so as to incorporate as much air as possible, until the dough is too stiff to be stirred; then knead thoroughly, form into rolls and bake.

DON'T WASTE CEREAL.

Always practice saving the cereal which adheres to the double boiler after the breakfast supply is perhaps too hurriedly removed.

To be carefully done, fill the container with cold water and when cleaning up time comes run a spatula or a supple bladed knife around and every particle of the cereal will easily come off.

Tip quickly through the strainer which should hang over your sink, and put aside the "salvage" thereby obtained to add to muffin and bread, griddle cakes, etc.

Bits of bread, gingerbread, doughnuts, broken cookies, etc., may be soaked and added to brown bread mixture, both to its advantage and that of conservation.



LORD GREY
AND AMERICA

(London Observer.)

It was inevitable that Lord Grey, with his lofty standard of public duty, should consent to undertake, so far as his health would allow, a task for which he was so pre-eminently qualified. America appreciates already his resolve to tax yet further his eyehight already imperilled in the public service, but not till she has learnt to know him will she understand with what a pang he abandons the English countryside he loves so dearly. Perhaps, too, she does not yet understand how ill England can spare him, even from the retired life which he now leads. Lord Grey is one of the very small group of English public men to whose prestige and authority the trappings of office make no difference.

Since his public appearances have become infrequent, his words carry all the greater weight. There is no living Englishman whom his countrymen hold in greater honor. The solid English qualities, love of country and of its soil, a certain instinct for quiet self-sacrifice, a stern and militant devotion to ideals—are often content to serve as foils to the more brilliant gifts of leaders from the Celtic fringes of the United Kingdom. But in Lord Grey they shone so conspicuously that in the day of crisis five years ago his words determined the nation's destiny. England is, indeed, sending her best to America, confident that the land which fostered Washington and Lincoln will know him for what he is.

MOST MORAL

Bristol, Eng., Sept. 26.—Llanelli, in South Wales, prides itself on absolute immunity from immorality of the professional kind. According to the chief constable, the morality of the town has reached such a plane that the people would not tolerate the unfortunate class. On this account he recommended that the proposed employment of policemen was unnecessary.
