

FEW WOMEN REGISTERED HERE TODAY

REVISORS READY, BUT
THE WOMEN ARE NOT

Little Interest Displayed by
Eligible Female Population
—Urged from Pulpit
to Register.

The Mayor's office at the City Hall was opened this morning for the registration of the women of twenty one years and upwards who wish to exercise their franchise in the coming election. Allec J. Wheeler, Chairman of the Board of Revisors, Ald. William McKay and Ald. Thomas S. Wilkinson are in charge registering the names of all those who apply. The first day's registration is very light and so far the women have shown no great tendency to register with the revisors and thus obtain the right to vote.

In this city there are between fourteen and eighteen hundred women, all British subjects, over twenty one years of age, who have the right to register and thus gain the franchise. This morning the revisors were ready but the women were not. Very few of them turned out to register, thus showing their lack of interest in the matter. In various churches yesterday the women were told that their duty lay in casting their votes the right way and were urged to register their names before October 5th with the revisors at the Mayor's office so that their vote would help in the referendum on Prohibition.

Up to two o'clock this afternoon but three women had registered.

Smallpox at Mapleridge.

Dr. G. G. Melvin, Chief Health Officer, state today that a case of smallpox was reported from Mapleridge, near Millville, York county, Saturday night. Dr. J. A. Wade, District Medical Health Officer, has gone to the scene and all precautions are being taken.

Today is St. Michael's Day, or Michaelmas, and is observed in some churches. A few years ago it was the opening day of the academic year at the University of New Brunswick, but the term now opens two weeks earlier. There also used to be a Michaelmas term of the courts.

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon states that two forest fire cases were heard before Magistrate Hanson at Andover on Tuesday last. Both offenders pleaded guilty to a charge of setting fires without permit and were fined \$10 and costs.

She is survived by her parents, one brother Ralph and one sister Winifred. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon interment being made at the Pickard Burying Ground. Service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Belliss.


Anglican Chaplain Present

The evening service was marked by a most pleasing and unusual incident which has been much commented upon. Major (Rev.) E. B. Hooper of the military hospital staff who was associated with Lt. Col. MacDonald in the overseas Chaplain Service, was discerned in the congregation. He had dropped in to hear his old friend expound the gospel and was located by the latter in the gallery soon after the service had begun. An usher was sent to him with an invitation to the platform which he graciously accepted. Lieut. Col. MacDonald in the course of his sermon referred to the presence of Chaplain Hooper and to the warm personal attachment which they had formed for each other while overseas. He also referred to the spirit of brotherly love which had existed in the Chaplain Service among Protestants as well as Roman Catholics.

At the conclusion of the service Chaplain Hooper briefly addressed the congregation paying a graceful tribute to Dr. MacDonald, whom he referred to as "My Son, Mac". He indorsed what the preacher had said in reference to the brotherly feeling which animated all in the Chaplain Service.

Lieut. Col. MacDonald has accepted the pastorate of the Baptist Church at Wolfville, N. S., and will enter upon his duties this week. This evening he will be tendered a banquet and reception at the Brunswick Street Baptist Church.
