

BOARD OF HEALTH ASKS FOR OFFICE IN CITY HALL

ORGANIZED UNDER NEW HEALTH ACT LAST NIGHT

G. Y. Dibblee Appointed Sec. and A. C. Flemming Insp. —Peter Farrell Acting Chairman.

The City of Fredericton Sub-district Board of Health organized last night. Dr. J. A. Wade of St. Andrews, District Health Officer was in the chair. Mr. Peter Farrell was elected chairman to preside on occasion of Dr. Wade's absence.

Officials Appointed

The Board last night appointed Mr. George Y. Dibblee secretary and Mr. A. C. Flemming Sanitary Officer. Mr. Dibblee was a member of the former Fredericton Board of Health for many years and in that capacity performed much valuable service. Recently he acted as secretary. Mr. Flemming has been health officer for some years. In this particular the new Board of Health begins with two officials of experience.

Other Appointments Later

The appointment of other officials required under the act, such as Plumbing Inspector, Food Inspector, etc., will be considered later. It is probable that some of the positions will be combined. The appointments made last night are until May 1st only, as new appointments for the year will be made then.

Office Accommodation Required

The City Council will be required to supply office accommodation for the Board of Health and it is expected that such office will be at the City Hall and will be open each day. The last Thursday of each month has been selected as the day of regular meetings of the Board.

IN HOSPITAL AT WESCHMA WITH SPANISH FLU

PRIVATE WALTER BURDEN LEFT BEHIND IN GERMANY

Fredericton Soldier, Prisoner Since 1915, Stricken with Illness When About to be Released.

Mrs. Weldon Burden of this city received today a telegram from Ottawa which was as follows: "Cable received from England states that No. 22556, Private Walter Burden, infantry, reported released prisoner of war, left behind in Weschma Hospital on December 27th with Spanish Influenza."

A letter dated some months back was received by Private Burden's mother in which he stated that he expected to be in England by January at least. His people have eagerly awaited news of his repatriation and with



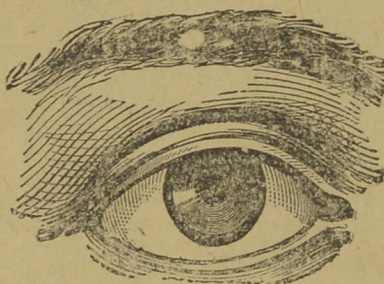

none coming they feared that something had happened to him. At the time his last letter was written he was confined to hospital and has evidently contracted the Spanish Influenza which was the cause of his being left behind at Weschma Hospital when his comrades were repatriated.

He had been a prisoner in Germany since 1915.

E. P. BRADT, NEW DEP. MINISTER, AT HIS OFFICE

Policy of Encouragement for Sheep Raising will be Continued—N. B. is Well Suited for It.

Mr. E. P. Bradt the new Deputy Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick, who arrived here yesterday took up his duties at the Department of Agriculture this morning. Mr. Bradt will spend some days getting acquainted with the workings of the department and local conditions.

To a reporter of the Mail this morning he stated that particular attention would be devoted to livestock production in this province and efforts made to encourage that important branch of agriculture.

Safest Basis of Agriculture

"The production of livestock is the safest basis of agriculture at the present time," said Mr. Bradt. "Animal products of all kinds have been bringing the highest prices and there is every reason for thinking that prices will keep up. Of course just at present there has been a slight falling off in the price of pork products because the British Purchasing Commission has announced that it has a five months' supply on the other side of the Atlantic and will not buy until that is consumed. Similar conditions exist in the States."

To Encourage Sheep-Raising

Mr. Bradt said also that the encouragement to sheep-raising which was given by the Department during the past two years would be continued. New Brunswick is considered naturally well suited to the raising of sheep.

The new Deputy Minister comes from Morrisburg, Ont., where he has been engaged in work for the Ontario Department of Agriculture for the past six years.

Weekly Roll-off

The regular weekly roll-off at the Palace Alleys will take place Monday evening twenty-five names being entered for it. The Woodstock Bowling team will appear on the scene on Monday evening playing the Palace team that evening and Tuesday afternoon. The bowling tournament will start next week.

Will Leave Service Soon

McGrath who has been in the Royal Air Service expects to be free of military service shortly. He will take a position in Toronto.

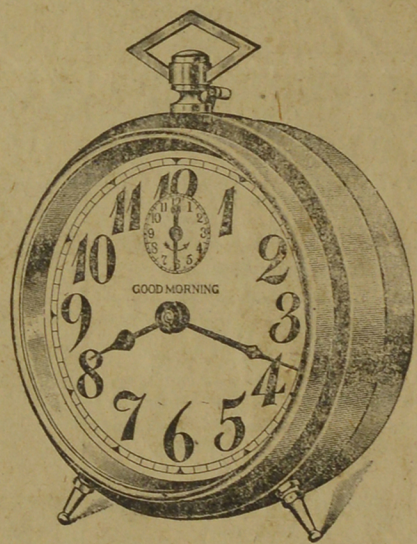
