## AN IMPORTANT STATEMENT BY PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE

Says if the Huns Do Not Sign the Peace Treaty at Versailles They Will Do So at Berlin—The Allies Have No Intention of Giving Way, Says the Premier—President Wilson Declares the Days of Secret Councils are Past.

London, May 30—Premier Lloyd George in his speech to the Welsh division at Amiens last Sunday, according to the South Wales Daily News:

"We say to the Germans: 'Gentlemen, you must sign. If you don't do so at Versailles, you shall do so in Berlin. We are not going to give way.'"

### Holds Conference

Paris, May 30—Premier Clemenceau had a conference yesterday with Marshal Petain, the commander-in-chief of the French army. The conference lasted half an hour.

The day of secret councils is past because the people are in the saddle. President Wilson declared in his Memorial Day address in the American cemetery at Sur-Esues. The private councils of statesmen, he added will no longer determine the destinies of nations.

An earnest defence of the League of Nations was a prominent note of the address. He said he looked for the time when a man who failed to support the League of Nations would be ashamed as the man who opposed the union of the states after the Civil War.

### Ready to Disarm

Berlin, Thursday, May 29—Germany is willing to agree to the proposed stipulation regarding her military, aerial and naval forces contained in the draft of the peace treaty, provided that she is permitted to enter the League of Nations on an equal footing immediately upon the signing of peace and particularly that she be permitted to share in the complete equality and reciprocity of all nations in the economic domain.

### Germany's League

This declaration is contained in the second section of the German memorandum embodying the counter-proposals to the peace terms. At the same time it is declared the German delegation holds to its idea of the superiority of its own draft of proposals for a League of Nations.

While the German government in agreeing to accept the stipulation referred to, it is thus ready to disarm before the other powers, the memorandum adds, the government must, on the other hand demand a transitional period during which it may keep the troops necessary for the maintenance of internal order. The "covering note" presented to the Peace Conference by the German delegation says:

"We come to Versailles expecting to receive a peace proposal framed according to the agreed basis. We had a firm resolve to do everything in our power to fulfill the heavy obligations assumed by us. We hoped for the peace of right which had been promised us. We were shocked when we read in that document the demands which the victorious might of our opponents had set forth. The more we studied the spirit of the treaty, the more we were convinced of the impossibility of carrying it out. The demands in this

### Rhineland Independent?

Frankfort, Thursday, May 29—Although a semi-official announcement was made here yesterday that the Rhineland was to be declared an independent republic today, advices from Coblenz say the step has not yet been taken. The leaders of the Centrist party, who were supposed to be in favor of separation, are said to be opposing it, unless the German national assembly and the Prussian diet deliberately approve of the plan and have it incorporated in the peace treaty.

ventilator several times but precautions taken in time prevented the building from burning. The coal shed of Mr. R. T. Baird also was damaged slightly.

### Furniture Damaged or Destroyed

Some of Corp. Lavoie's household effects were saved, but very few of those of Mr. Murdock. In Mr. McMurray's barn were a number of articles of furniture which had been sold by auction during the day but not removed. Among them were two pianos. All were destroyed together with harness and other carriage fittings. Some furniture also was stored in the Adams property but was saved.

### The Second Fire

When another fire was announced by an alarm from box 52 the Fire Department was severely taxed. A quick response was made however, both the Chief and Assistant Chief going, Chief Rutter returning to the Court House Square fire. Judge Crockett's furniture was practically all removed in short order. The fire was confined to the roof which was however much damaged.

Insurance Carried in Some Cases  
Mr. Edgecombe carried \$2,800 insurance on the building but neither of his tenants had insurance on furniture. The Adams building was unoccupied and not insured. The other properties which suffered damage were insured. Ten thousand dollars is thought to cover the total loss on the fires.

Damaged by Previously  
The Edgecombe building was damaged by fire in 1890 when occupied by the late John G. Adams and family.

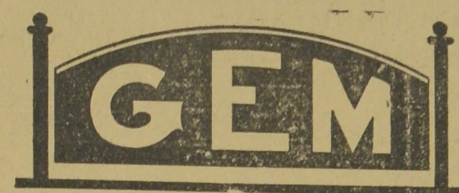
