## THE HEARST GOVERNMENT IS STILL CARRYING ON

Has Been Requested by the Lieutenant Governor to Remain in Office a Few Days Longer—The United Farmers Expected to Change Their Name in a Short Time—Conservatives Will Choose a New Leader.

Toronto, Oct 31—Sir William Hearst was expected to have tendered to Sir John Hendrie lieutenant-governor the resignation of his government today, but it is understood that he did not do so. However the resignation is due very shortly. It is understood that Sir William Hearst conferred with the lieutenant-governor today as to the present political situation, and that at the governor's request Sir William agreed to carry on the affairs of the province for a week or two longer in order to give the incoming government ample time to prepare to assume their responsibility.

Rev. F. P. Dennison, in October, 1917. They lived in Hampton. In February 1918, the plaintiff enlisted with the 9th Seige Battery. He alleges that his wife afterwards went to St. John's where she was unfaithful to him with a soldier at the Brunswick Hotel and with others, that in June 1918 she went through a marriage ceremony performed by the Rev. James F. Rowley at Hampton with one Frederick W. Carson with whom she afterwards lived as man and wife. Divorce is asked on usual grounds.

Ernest Roland Price vs. Ida May Price—The parties belong to St. Stephen, the defendant being formerly Lesner. The marriage ceremony was performed at St. Stephen in November 1910 by Rev. S. B. Howard, Methodist. A child was born of the union in 1911. In 1914 the plaintiff enlisted with the 26th Battalion and went overseas in June 1915, returning in May, 1919. He alleges that in September, 1916 the defendant left her home in St. Stephen and went to Calais to live with one Frank Vickery. The husband accuses his wife that during his absence she was unfaithful to him and that sometime in June or July, 1917, she gave premature birth to a child and that she is still living with Vickery at Calais. Absolute divorce is asked.

Henry Andrew Hewitt vs. Sarah Hewitt—The parties are of St. John, the defendant formerly McCracken. Marriage took place at St. John in February, 1915, the officiating clergyman being Rev. David Hutchinson, Baptist. Two children were the issue of the marriage. The plaintiff states that in August 1916 he went overseas as a member of the 58th Howitzer Battery and returned in July 1919, that in February 1919 an illegitimate child was born to his wife and that one John Melanson of St. John is the father. Melanson is named as the co-respondent in the action for divorce.

George Lawrence vs. Annie Lawrence—The parties belong to Beresford, Gloucester County, the defendant being before marriage Tilbert. The marriage was solemnized by the Rev. A. D. McCully at Bathurst in May, 1910. Two children were born in wedlock. In 1915 the plaintiff enlisted and went overseas returning in 1919, when in July of that year he found his wife with her sister at the home of another man in Moncton. At the time she had in her arms a two-and-a-half months old child, which she acknowledged to be hers and also confessed to having borne another child on a previous occasion, of which her husband was not the father. Divorce is asked on the ground of infidelity.

George McDonald vs. Mary Louise McDonald—The parties are of Upham Kings County, but the defendant formerly Hutchinson is residing in Marysville where she is a cotton mill operative. The marriage was solemnized in December, 1913, at Moncton by Rev. Wm. J. Lane, Methodist. Two children were born to the marriage. The plaintiff alleges that his wife since August 1917 has been unfaithful to her vows both at Upham and St. John and names one Richard W. McDonald as the co-respondent. Divorce is sought on usual grounds.

Warren J. Wilson vs. Irene C. Wilson—Plaintiff is of Hopewell, Albert County and defendant at present is of Halifax, she being before marriage

Conservative party in Ontario was discussed at some length today in the parliament buildings where members elected and defeated conservative candidates gathered to talk over the matter. The gathering included the members of the retiring government.

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, minister of lands, forests and mines, was chosen the party leader until after the next session of the legislature. Then a conservative will be called and a permanent leader appointed.

#### May Change Party Name

No word has come from E. C. Drury leader of the U.F.O. and prospective premier of Ontario since he left Toronto Thursday evening for his farm in Simcoe county—that is, no word for the public. It is believed here that the name United Farmers of Ontario will be changed before long and a name less significant of the sectional or class idea, chosen. It is possible that this new party has come to stay, and as means to this end it is suggested that it be called the People's Party. Secretary J. J. Morrison said today that it was probable the U. F. O. movement would broaden out and even seek to extend its influence in the cities.

#### Hearst Retiring

Sir William Hearst who suffered a personal defeat in the recent provincial general elections, as well as the defeat of his government, is quitting political life at least for the present. He has not shown any disposition to try to win another seat, having lost the one he held so long—Sault Ste. Marie. Neither has he shown any inclination to remain in the political limelight. It was rumored in this city today that Sir William Hearst would soon be appointed a judge of the Supreme Court of Ontario in succession to Mr. Justice Britton, who was said to contemplate retiring.

With the retirement of Dr. H. J. Cody from the ministry of education, it is thought he may resign his seat in the legislature. Anticipating this, although Dr. Cody has not given any intimation of it, the name of Lieutenant Colonel Kelly Evans is spoken of as that of the candidate of the Grand Army of Canada and it is said the United Veterans' League would probably endorse Colonel Evans' candidature. Colonel Evans ran for seat "B", Hon. Dr. Cody was re-elected for seat "A" northwest Toronto by acclamation. Sam Carter the unsuccessful independent liberal candidate in South Wellington has applied for a recount, alleging irregularities on the part of the deputy returning officers in counting the ballots. The official majority of Rev. C. H. Buckland, over Mr. Carter has been announced as 125.

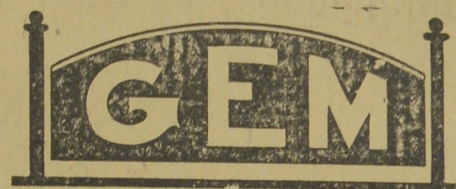
#### Held Successful Social

Willie Wallace Branscombe vs. Alice Blanche Branscombe—Parties are of the Parish of Salisbury, Westmorland County, the defendant formerly being Keith. The marriage took place at Petitediac in December, 1911, Rev. Chas. Flemington officiating. The husband accuses his wife of infidelity with one M. S. Alward, whom he names as co-respondent and alleges that his wife has given birth to a child of which he is not the father. Divorce is asked on statutory grounds.

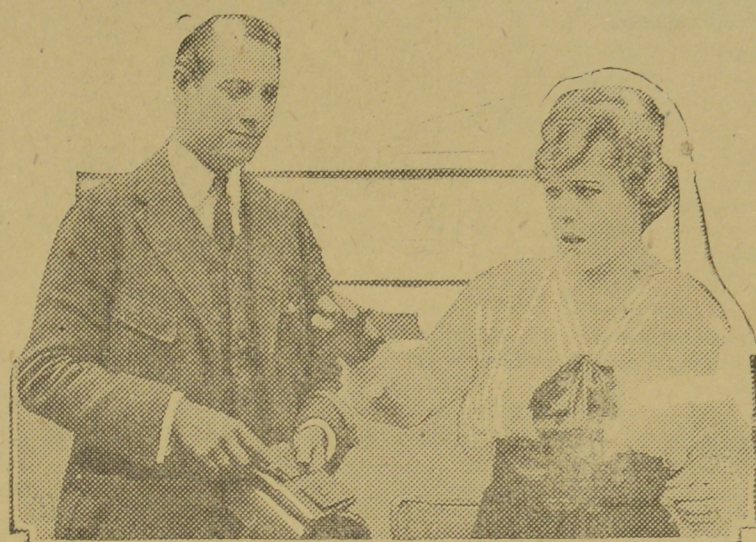
