

HALLOWE'EN CELEBRATED WITH SPIRIT

TWO U. N. B. STUDENTS ARRESTED BY POLICE

Girl in Highlander's Uniform
—College Boys Fined for
Vagrancy—Must Make
Damage Good.

Hallowe'en was celebrated in lively fashion last evening and two arrests were made in consequence. They both were U. N. B. undergraduates who were caught in the act of trying to adorn a sign-board on the roof of the Arctic Rink with paint. They appeared in police court and were fined \$20 each for vagrancy and were remanded until this afternoon when if the owners of the property, which they damaged, will not press the suit and the young men are willing to pay the costs of the damage they will be released. Those whom their friends will have to interview are Messrs. James S. Neill, Havelock Coy, and Morris Block. The window of the law office of Mr. Havelock Coy, registrar of the University were generously ornamented with paint. The legend is "Shylock Coyski, Sups a specialty". Two dollar signs also appear and the inference is that the painting is a delicate reference to the fact that supplemental examinations have been numerous at U.N.B. with the accompanying fee of two dollars each.

Girl Wore Kill

False alarms of fire were numerous during the night and in the earlier hours there were many girls and young women, parading the streets in male costume. One young lady wore a Highlander's uniform with rather abbreviated kill.

Other Incidents

Store signs in the lower end of Queen Street were slightly altered, letters being painted out and others being put in their places so that several quaint inscriptions resulted. Door steps were removed and in several parts of the city the telephone wires were decorated with articles of furniture. The kiddies occupied the scene, the early part of the evening in their house to house canvass for apples, fruits or candy.

Caused a Blaze

Last evening some of the Hallowe'en parties set fire to the old shack on the Flats which caused a good sized blaze but did no other damage.

RECORD NUMBER DIVORCE CASES FILED WITH REGISTRAR FOR NEXT SITTINGS OF COURT ON TUESDAY

Eleven New Cases and Three Remanets—All Will Not Go on Docket—Returned Soldiers Concerned in Nine of Eleven New Cases—Wives are Defendants in All But One Case Out of Eleven—Sole Defendant Husband a Returned Man.

The largest number of cases ever filed for a term of the New Brunswick Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes, is filed with Registrar H. G. Fenety for the term which will open on Tuesday next. It is not likely, however that all will be entered on the docket as several will go over to the next term.

The weakening of morals which appears to have attended the Great War is observable in connection with these cases as nine of the eleven concern men who went overseas with the Canadian Expeditionary Force. In all but one of those nine cases it is the wife who is accused of infidelity.

Several Remanets

In addition to the eleven new cases filed there are several remanets from previous terms of the court. The cases of Mignault vs. Mignault from Grand Falls and Piers vs. Piers from King's County though entered before haven't been heard. The case of Wilson vs. Wilson from St. John in which a returned soldier is concerned, is to come up for additional evidence.

Defendant at Marysville

In one of the new cases filed the defendant wife is a resident of Marysville being an operative in the mill of Canadian Cottons Limited in that town, having removed some time ago from St. John. She is Mrs. Mary Louise McDonald. The co-respondent in this action is said to be a relative of the plaintiff husband.

One Fredericton Case

Montford vs. Montford is a Fredericton case the plaintiff husband being here now. The wife formerly resided here and her children which were taken by the Children's Aid Society are in the home conducted here by that organization.

One Defendant Husband

There is but one defendant husband in the eleven new cases. He is Harry Andrews of St. John, a returned soldier charged with infidelity since his return from overseas.

Bigamous Marriage Alleged

In the suit of James Hilyard Carson vs. Ernestine M. Carson a bigamous marriage on the part of the defendant with Frederick W. Carson at Hampton is alleged.

Summary of Cases

The following is a summary of the cases filed with the Registrar of the

Divorce Court since the regular sittings of the Court in July:

Arthur Bedford Crossman vs. Eva Crossman—The parties reside in Moncton the defendant being formerly Eva Brown. They were married in London, England, on March 29th, 1918, by John Wallis, a Deputy Registrar. Two days later the plaintiff left London for France, returning in April, 1919, and immediately sailing for Canada. His wife had sailed for Canada the previous December arriving at St. John, and proceeding to Moncton, where she has since resided. The plaintiff alleges that during his absence his wife led a lewd and dissolute life, that she has been unfaithful to her marriage vows and that in August, 1919, she was to be the mother of a child of which he is not the father. Divorce is asked on the usual statutory grounds.

Bertha H. Andrews vs. Harry Andrews—The parties are residents of St. John, the plaintiff being formerly McCallum. The marriage took place at St. John West, February 13, 1912. Rev. W. R. Robinson, Baptist being the officiating clergyman. In 1914 the defendant enlisted and went overseas, returning in 1918. The plaintiff accuses her husband of infidelity since his return and names Florence Phillips as co-respondent. A daughter was born to the contracting parties in June, 1913. Divorce is sought on usual grounds.

William Edgar Montford vs. Elsie May Montford—The plaintiff resides in Fredericton and the defendant at present is of Halifax, the latter before marriage being Elsie May Fowler. The marriage ceremony was performed in July, 1911, by Rev. G. F. Scovill, Episcopalian, at St. John. The plaintiff alleges that he enlisted in 1915, went overseas, returning in 1918. Two children were born in wedlock, one in 1913 and the other in 1915. In consequence his wife's behaviour these children in 1917 were taken over and cared for by The Children's Aid Society. The plaintiff accuses his wife as being unfaithful in his absence and names as co-respondents, J. J. Thompson, Geo. Best and Fred Ramsey. Absolute divorce is asked.

James Hilyard Carson vs. Ernestine M. Carson—Plaintiff is of Hampton, the defendant at present of Lewiston, Me. was formerly Hodgkins. The marriage was solemnized at St. John by
