

RIVER TOO LOW FOR MANY BANK LOGS TO ARRIVE

GOOD RUN EXPECTED WITH HIGHER WATER

Captain John S. Scott is Superintendent of the Corporation Drive at Grand Falls.

Bank Logs are beginning to arrive at Springhill in fair quantities but the water is not high enough to bring the big run. The rafts which have arrived so far are chiefly contract lots for Fraser Limited. Some farmers have brought down small lots of logs for sale. Prices are reported to be slightly lower than they were at this time last year but competition among buyers may raise it later in the season.

Preparing for Corporation Drive

The St. John River Log Driving Company is preparing for driving operations below Grand Falls. Capt. John S. Scott who returned from overseas a few days ago after lengthy service in France and Belgium with Railway Construction Troops has been appointed superintendent of driving operations below Grand Falls. He will leave for that place tonight to take charge of preliminary arrangements. It will be some days before logs will be coming over the falls in any numbers.

At this point the St. John River is falling slightly on account of cool weather. Rain would be of great benefit to the lumbermen. Word from Grand Falls is to the effect that the river above that point is low. The ice went over the falls a few days ago.

At Blissville he was brought up before Judge Smith and was fined \$200 and costs. It is said some man in St. John wired the money to pay the fine.

Residence Being Repaired

Grant & Horne of St. John have been given the contract of repairing the residence of Mr. J. F. VanBuskirk of this city recently damaged by fire. Work has already begun on the damaged building. While repairs are being made Mr. VanBuskirk and family are occupying the Fraser residence, Woodstock Road.

Canadian Express Strike

The strike of the employees of the Canadian Express Company which was declared off Friday is to have its principal difficulties adjudicated upon by the Railway and Adjustment Board which is composed of six representatives of the railways and six representatives of labor. The points in dispute were legal holidays, eight hour day and mileage.

Lumber Importations

Faranworth & Jardine's wood circular published at Liverpool, April 1, 1919, has the following on imports of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia pine deals: The Mersey, including the Manchester Canal, received an import of 2,160 standards, the bulk going to Manchester. Deliveries show a total of 2,250 standards, evenly distributed between the two ports. Stocks slightly reduced and stand at 8,570 standards.

MANY RETURNED SOLDIERS ARE ON THE OLYMPIC, ADRIATIC AND GRAMPIAN—SOME ORIGINAL FIRSTS

Several Military Medalists Among the Men Returning to This City and Vicinity—Lieut. Donald B. Winslow, M. C., Arrived Saturday Night—Majority of Returned Men will Arrive Tonight and Tuesday—Pte. Walter Burden Back After Several Years in German Prison.

The steam ships Adriatic and Olympic docked at Halifax with a large number of passengers and the liner Grampian docked at St. John. There are a large number of Fredericton men on board including a war prisoner and several "Original Firsts". Some of the returned men are expected in the city this evening.

Bombardier William McKenzie

Bombardier McKenzie is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnston McKenzie of this city. He enlisted with the 23rd Battery in 1914 and was transferred to the 24th Battery with which he went overseas in February 1915. He arrived in France in June. He was slightly wounded with shrapnel at the third battle of Ypres and was gassed at Passchendaele and at the fighting in the East Salient. He went to Germany after the signing of the Armistice with the 1st Division being stationed at Cologne. He arrived in England in March.

Pte. Arthur J. Hodges M. M.

Pte. Arthur J. Hodges M. M. enlisted in 1914 with volunteers from the 71st York Regt. and went overseas with the 12th Battalion. Prior to his enlistment he was employed at the Queen Hotel in this city. He saw extensive service overseas and was awarded the Military Medal for distinguished conduct.

Lieut. D. B. Winslow, M. C.

Lieut. D. B. Winslow M. C. son of Mrs. T. B. Winslow of this city arrived here Saturday evening. He went overseas with the 64th Nova Scotia Battalion and was later transferred to the 5th C. M. R. He was wounded in 1916. He has been serving on the staff of the 1st Division for the last year or so. He crossed on the Carmania and landed at Halifax Friday. Lieut. Winslow was awarded the Military Cross. Prior to appointment to the C. E. F. he was with a brokerage firm at Regina and probably will return there. Some years ago he was secretary of Public Works of New Brunswick.

Driver Ernest H. Coy

Driver E. H. Coy is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Havelock Coy of this city. He

enlisted in November 1914 with the 23rd Battery and went overseas in February 1915. He was transferred to the 8th Battery and arrived in France in May 1915. When the 8th Battery was broken up he was transferred to the 11th Battery with which he has seen long service. He came through the important engagements of Passchendaele, Courcelette, Vimy Ridge, Lens and others without receiving a scratch.

Sgt. C. M. Cadwallader

Sgt. C. M. Cadwallader is a son of Prof. Edward Cadwallader of this city. He enlisted at Winnipeg and went overseas in the 1st Division as a bandsman and was later transferred to the 10th Battalion. He was finally transferred to a Forestry Corps and was buried by a shell. He has spent considerable time in hospital recovering from injuries.

Pte. R. B. Barton

Pte. R. B. Barton of South Devon went overseas with the 236th MacLean Highlanders. He arrived on the Olympic at Halifax.

Sgt. Major C. H. Forbes M. M.

Sgt. Major Forbes is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Forbes of South Devon. He enlisted in 1914 with the 1st Field Ambulance as a private and went overseas with that body. He has been promoted until he acquired the rank of Regimental Sgt. Maj. He was awarded the Military Medal last year for distinguished conduct. He went overseas with Bert Boone, George Betts, Gerald Carten and other well known Fredericton boys.

Pte. John L. Brewer

Pte. John L. Brewer is one of the passengers on the Olympic. He is a son of the late Mered Brewer of this city. He went overseas in 1914 with the 71st Regiment Band which afterwards became the 12th Battalion Band. He stayed with that band for some time and was then transferred to the 2nd Battalion with which he saw long and strenuous service. He escaped being wounded or injured.

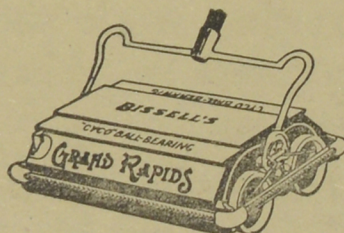

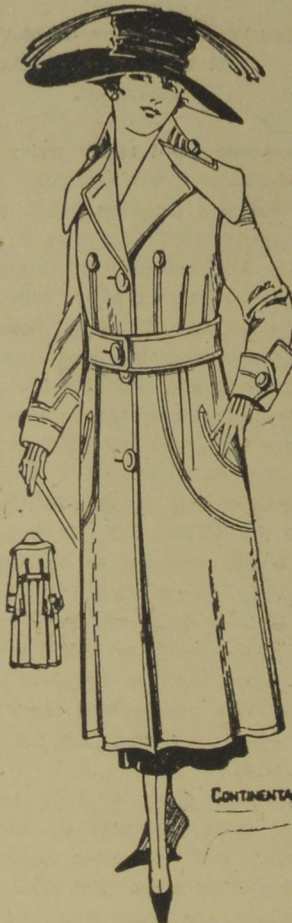
