WANT EDITORS FROM U. S. TO VISIT THE MARITIMES

Mr. J. T. Hawke Has Important Resolution Adopted by the Maritime Board of Trade—Amherst, N. S., Chosen as the Next Place of Meeting—Resolution on Maritime Union Adopted and Other Matters Dealt With.

Moncton, N. B., Sept. 18—The closing session of the twenty-first annual convention of the Maritime Board of Trade was held this morning in the City Hall here and the delegates who remained in the city were entertained to an automobile drive around the city and suburbs this afternoon. Harmony prevailed throughout the sessions, many of the speakers strongly emphasizing a spirit of unity among the people of the Maritime Provinces in dealing with problems that are of maritime concern. Maritime union was strongly urged by many of the speakers and the advantages to be derived from united efforts in advertising and developing the potentialities of the maritime provinces were pointed out. "We have wonderful harbors, splendid rivers, growing forests and rich mines. All we need is harmonious effort," said H. J. Logan, K. C., of Amherst, the new president.

Amherst was chosen as the next place of meeting. An invitation was also received from St. John, but as the board had met this year in New Brunswick it was decided to meet next year in Nova Scotia.

At this morning's session the resolution moved by H. J. Logan on Wednesday night requesting the governments of the maritime provinces to call a convention at an early date to discuss maritime union was unanimously carried. J. T. Hawke Moncton spoke of maritime union from the educational standpoint and declared that one of the things needed is a more uniform schedule of teachers' salaries. He spoke of experiences while touring the Canadian west showing the tremendous exodus of excellent teachers from the maritime provinces during recent years. The superior financial inducements of the west are almost entirely to blame for this condition.

A. A. McNeill—"I believe maritime union is a dead issue as far as Prince Edward Island is concerned. We put our necks in a yoke when we joined Canada."

Want Editors Here

The following resolution was introduced by John T. Hawke, Moncton, seconded by R. E. Armstrong, St. John and unanimously carried.

"Whereas the National Editorial Association of the United States has recently conducted an excursion through the four western provinces of the Dominion of Canada and inasmuch as such excursions was through published correspondence productive of much useful publicity respecting the advantages of these provinces as fields for settlement and also for touring which justified the co-operation of the dominion public services.

"And whereas the said editorial association in the year 1920 holds its annual convention in the city of Boston.

"Therefore, be it resolved that this Maritime Board of Trade, recognizing that the excursion arranged for the year 1919 was in its carrying out beneficial to the dominion and especially the western provinces, believes that the department of immigration and also the Canadian National Railway board of directors should, under conditions similar to those under which the recent editorial excursion was held, take the necessary steps to induce the National Editorial Association to conduct their excursion next year through the provinces of Ontario, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia to Massachusetts, and;

"Further resolved that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the minister of agriculture and also to the board of directors of the Canadian National Railway.

Mr. Hawke gave the convention some facts regarding the recent tour of the National Editorial Association.

of the United States through the Canadian west.

"We learned from them, and they learned from us," he said.

Mr. Hawke said that when they had finished touring from Winnipeg westward he had said to the Americans, "You have seen only half of Canada—you have the better half yet to see. (Applause.) Mr. Hawke incidentally referred to the tremendous development which is taking place in the northern part of Quebec. In that part of the country where three years ago the first train made its journey there, are springing up towns of from one to three thousand persons while the industrial development is marvelous. "I believe," he said, "that Quebec will yet become our greatest industrial province."

Mr. Hawke said that he had urged the American editors to visit this part of the country next year, and he believed that such a visit would be of vast benefit to the maritime provinces.

THE WONDER PLAY OF THE YEAR TONIGHT

"Which One Shall I Marry" is the wonder play of the year, dealing as it does with the greatest question in the life of every man and woman where the vital decision of a lifetime hangs redolent with romance and posterity it taps a vein of sincerity that has been virgin to the theatre.

The girl is beloved by her employer a very rich man, and also by a workman in the mills, who is a poor man. Both declare their love for her. Her mother desires a match with wealth, while the father begs her to let her heart decide the question. Dropping on her knees she prays to the Supreme Being for council. Here the author has again used the allegorical for her soul is transported to the great forest of doubt, and therein she meets the rich man, the poor man and Advice. Lured by the glitter of wealth, her soul is lost in the gulf of gold and the rich man takes her to his home.

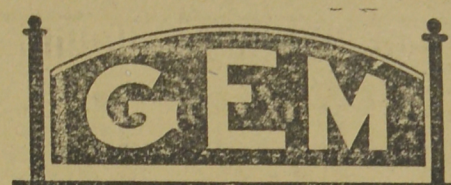
The second act shows what her life would be as the wife of the rich man. She is happy because she can want for nothing and she is lonesome. There is no escape from the terrible overpowering wealth, and therefore in a cup of wine she seeks that great relief and her soul passes on to the land of sham where it is met by the poor man who points the way to sunshine and happiness.

The third act shows what her life would be as the wife of the poor man, and at its end a tiny baby garment bespeaks the thought of a greater happiness to come. She has been in the land of make-believe and when she suddenly awakens she finds herself back at her mother's knee just as she was at the end of the first act. Both men have come for their answer and her ultimate decision gives the play a novel twinge and makes it the most note-worthy love story of the year.
