

## POLICE HAVING A LIVELY TIME THIS WEEK

### HEAVY FINES FOR TWO PROHIBITION VIOLATORS

**Boiestown Men in Fight With  
the Police Last Evening—  
Arrested and Re-  
manded.**

For the past few days the Fredericton police station has brought back a vision of old times to several of the older members of the force. Drunks and others have been accumulating during the present week and it brings back old times when whiskey was so plentiful in this city. Three Boiestown men were arrested last evening after a lively scrap, one for drunkenness and resistance, and the other two for interference with and assaulting the police. They all pleaded guilty and were remanded until the 22nd. Two drunks were fined \$8 or thirty days in jail and two prohibition cases were heard. The two offenders were caught in the streets with bottles and were fined \$8 or 30 days in jail each for being drunk and \$100 or 3 months in jail each for violating the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916.

#### Scrap Last Night

A lively scrap occurred last evening between six and seven o'clock on King Street near the York Hotel when two of the special police started to arrest a man from Boiestown named Mc Cluskey for being drunk and using profane language. His two brothers who were in the near vicinity seeing the police arresting him assaulted them and they were forced to let the other man go to defend themselves.

#### Called For Help

A mob gathered to watch the fight and for a time matters were going against the police. A call was sent into the police station and Sergeant Nathaniel Jones accompanied by Patrolman Yerxa hurried to the scene of the fight and arrested the combatants. They were locked up in cells overnight and came before the Police Magistrate this morning. One pleaded guilty to being drunk, using profane language and assaulting the police, while the other two pleaded guilty to charges of interfering with the police in the performance of duties and assaulting them. They were all remanded until Monday the 22nd for judgment.

#### Car Parties Here

A large number of car parties from the various parts of the Province and from outside points have been registered at the local hotels for the past week. Many have left the same evening as they have arrived but others have remained to spend the week at the Fredericton Exhibition.

#### One More Flu Case

Dr. G. C. Melvin, Chief Health Officer for the Province announced this morning that another "flu" case had been reported from Upper Woodstock. Dr. J. A. Wade, D. M. H. O., is on the scene and every precaution necessary is being taken to prevent the spreading of the disease. All the cases reported are light ones.

#### Pullets Shelling Out

The model poultry house being shown at the exhibition by Poultry Superintendent McCulloch is attracting a great deal of attention. Yesterday Mr. McCulloch installed ten Plymouth Rock Pullets in the house and they at once settled down to business. During the afternoon and evening six eggs were gathered from the flock which is a pretty good showing.

#### Returned From Overseas

Gnr. Wilfred Robert, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Roberts of Brunswick Street, arrived home from overseas on Wednesday evening. Gnr. Roberts went overseas in 1917 with a draft of the 9th Siege Battery. He has been in England ever since where he has been attached to a headquarters staff. Gnr. Roberts is being warmly welcomed by many old friends in this city.

#### Had Accident Yesterday

Mr. Robert Barr of Queen Street was rendered unconscious yesterday in a collision with an automobile. Mr. Barr was coming down Queen Street about three o'clock and on attempting to turn out Westmorland Street he crossed, between two cars striking the hind one owned and driven by Mr. F. H. Estabrooks of Gagetown. He was knocked down and laid unconscious while the wheel which he was riding was smashed. Dr. H. H. McNally was summoned and rendered medical assistance. An examination showed that outside of a few bruises Mr. Barr was uninjured. Police Sergeant Nathaniel Jones who was present took Mr. Barr to his home in Mr. Estabrooks' car. This morning outside of the pain caused by several bruises the victim of the accident was alright.

## NEW ATTENDANCE RECORD PUT ON BY FREDERICTON EXHIBITION OF 1919; YESTERDAY SAW A RECORD CROWD

**More Than 12,000 Persons Paid Admission Yesterday—The  
Sprinkle of Rain Last Night Did Not Keep Them Away—  
Baby Show and Stock Parade Features Today— Pictures  
of Prize Winners Taken for Department of Public Infor-  
mation—Fair will be Complete Until Saturday Night at  
10.30, When Exhibits May be Removed.**

All doubt of a new attendance record at the Fredericton exhibition of 1919 vanished last night when 12,416 people clicked the turnstiles making the biggest day's attendance ever recorded at a Fredericton fair. This is almost three thousand better than the best of any former day. Up to last night the attendance totalled 30,642 which is some fifteen hundred less than the total six days' attendance at the 1915 exhibition.

#### Grounds Crowded Last Night

The Exhibition is playing in great luck as far as rain is concerned, the only rain of the fair was at night. Last night there was a slight sprinkle for several hours but it did not dampen the ardour of the spectators nor keep anyone away. The grounds never were so crowded. The afternoon attendance was also large.

#### Fredericton Attractions Make Hit

The free attractions shown on the big platform at the rear of the grounds are making a big hit with the crowds. The aerial act on the wire was particularly well received last night the crowds applauding again and again. The women acrobats with their pyramid-building and other "stunts" also are taking well.

#### Till the Last "Gun-fire."

Secretary Hooper this morning made the announcement that the fair would be in full operation until 10:30 Saturday. No curtailment on the last night will be permitted and all exhibits will be left as they have been.

#### Taking Pictures of Stock

A new departure at the fair is the taking of pictures of the prize stock. This is being done by Mr. E. J. Savage of the Department of Public Information. The animals were paraded for the benefit of the photographer who secured some great photographs.

#### Stock Parade and Baby Show

The big features of today's fair is the Baby Show and the parade of the

prize winning animals in the show ring. Both are attracting great attention.

#### Sentence Given This Morning

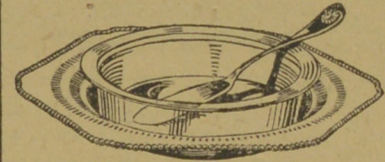
