LIBERALS OF ROYAL HELD SUCCESSFUL CONVENTION

Delegates Chosen to Represent the United Counties at the National Liberal Convention—Important Resolutions Adopted—a Welcome to the Men Who Have Returned from Overseas—Liberals are Urged to Get Together.

Hampton, N. B. July 17—The Liberal convention for Kings and Queens (Royal) was held this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock at the County Court House both counties were represented and a most successful convention was held. The entire meeting endorsed the union of Liberals.

The convention was called to order by Hon. Dr. J. E. Hetherington, M. P. for Queen's county, speaker of the house of assembly. He opened the meeting with an address asking that all those present put themselves on record as being in favor of a united Liberal party. He said that during the last election he was a Laurier Liberal while some of his neighbors and friends were Unionists, yet he did not mean to throw bricks at any one, neither did he want any bricks thrown at him.

After the address the nomination for chairman and secretary for the meeting was in order, and J. R. McLean, of Sussex was nominated chairman and G. Hazen Adair, of Sussex was nominated secretary. After this the election of delegates to attend the convention at Ottawa took place. The following were nominated: Kings county—G. Hazen Adair, Sussex; E. A. Harmer, Norton; Sterling Keith, Havelock; Dr. G. N. Pearson, Sussex; Thomas A. Gilliland, Hammond River. Dr. Pearson did not accept the nomination, but the other four delegates did. G. Hazen Adair and E. A. Harmer were elected to attend the convention while S. Keith and T. Gilliland are to act as substitutes. Queens county—Richard Reid, Gagetown, delegate to convention; James Robinson, Cambridge, substitute.

At the conclusion of the election of delegates a resolution committee was appointed consisting of George A. King, M.P.P. Chipman; Hon. Mr. Ferris of Queens county; E. S. Carter, Rothesay; Dr. J. E. Hetherington, M. P. P. of Cady. The committee adjourned and drew up the following resolutions, which were unanimously accepted by the entire meeting.

The first resolution which expressed regret at the death of the Liberal chieftain, Sir Wilfrid Laurier read as follows:

Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to remove from his sphere of earthly activity our great revered leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and where as his death at this period is an irreparable loss to our nation and the whole country;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Liberals of Royal in convention assembled here express our profound regret and deplore the loss occasioned by his death to the whole country, when at this period of his life, his statesmanship, his high minded and lofty patriotism, his farseeing breadth of vision, his single-mindedness of purpose, his courage and ability as a debater and leader are so badly needed, and

The second resolution which expressed welcome to the men who have returned from overseas and also of sympathy to the relatives of those who have fallen on the field of battle read as follows:

Whereas, very many of the sons of Kings and Queens counties played their part and fought the battles of their country overseas during the war.

Resolved that this convention take advantage of the opportunity afforded them to convey its great and sincere appreciation of their efforts, and to extend their sympathy to the relatives of those who have fallen in the fight for liberty, and to commend to the consideration of those in authority their dependents, so that it will be unnecessary for them to endure privation, and further to insist that those who were wounded and incapacitated in anyway receive such treatment at the hands of this country that they will never regret their efforts in that behalf.

The third resolution expressed the hope that perfect unity in the Liberal party be established. It read as follows:

Whereas, the reason for the difference of opinion which arose in the Liberal party at the last general election having disappeared at the end of the war and the declaration of peace, and

Whereas, it is absolutely in the best interests of the country that there should be a united Liberal party.

Resolved, that all of those in attendance at this convention pledge themselves to work in the interests of having and to do everything possible to create a greater Liberalism embracing all those principles so essential to the advancement, progressiveness and success of the country.

At the conclusion of the reading of these resolutions by Hon. J. E. Hetherington, M. P. P. the meeting closed with three rousing cheers for the Liberal party.

The meeting resembled more a good old nomination day than a convention. A more representative meeting could not be wished for. Practically the entire counties were represented. The convention was extremely harmonious not one discordant note being sounded. The convention was felt by all to be most successful and the entire Liberal party of Royal were highly pleased with the progress and success created by the convention.

REPORTED OFFICIALLY DEAD

Formerly reported missing—Went overseas with 236th Battalion—Missing Since Last September.

This morning's casualty list from Ottawa includes the name of Pte. J. W. Williams of North Devon as officially declared dead. Pte. Williams went overseas with the 236th MacLean Highlanders and was later transferred to another Infantry Battalion in France. Last September he was declared officially missing and this morning's despatches declare him officially dead.

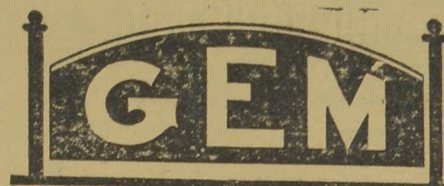
