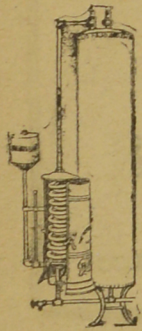

AROUND THE CITY

The grading of Queen's Square and the removal of trees from it preparatory to the use of the ground as a public recreation ground next year, has made a great difference in the appearance of that section of the city. The square, not counting that southern portion which the C. N. R. has fenced off but has not yet paid for, has an area of some seven and a half acres, including the area fenced off the area is upwards of ten acres. Ampitheatre exists for ball fields etc. The birch trees which were cut down are piled along Church street. Some of them are sound and are fine specimens of the hardwood produced in this section of New Brunswick which unfortunately are put to no industrial use.

Chestnut & Sons will see the end of a landmark in civic politics for in past years many important matters were thrashed out in the office of the stable before they were given to the public in committee or council meeting. That was in the days when the late Israel R. Golding conducted the stable and was an alderman for Carleton Ward. Several of the senior members of the Council including the late Patrick Farrell, the late John Moore, the late John Maxwell and Dr. Henry now a resident of Saskatchewan made a practice of gathering there with the proprietor and discussing civic problems in required privacy. So widely known did it become that city business was transacted to a great extent in the office of the stable that on one occasion when the seal of the city was mislaid at the time of the swearing in of the late W. T. Whitehead as mayor, he suggested that it might be found at Golding's Stable.

Things are not always what they seem. Within a few days ago a little boy observing one of the members of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police dressed in blue with yellow facings, asked him in shrill childish treble, "Mister, is there going to be a band concert?" 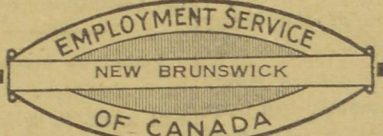
