

SETTLEMENT RE INSPECTORSHIP NOT REACHED

POLICE COMMISSION TO MEET NEXT WEEK

Chief Inspector Cannot Accept
Half and Half Arrangement
—Secretary D. B. Hark-
ness Here.

The question of the sub-inspectorship for Fredericton under the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 still is unsettled. It was reported a short time ago that Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson had agreed to the proposition of the Police Commission that the province pay half the salary of \$1,500 of the Chief of Police and have him combine the duties of sub-inspector with those of police chief. It is understood on good authority, however, that recently Chief Inspector Wilson notified Chief Finley that the proposition could not be accepted by him "at the present time."

Commission to Meet Wednesday

The Police Commission will meet at eleven o'clock next Wednesday morning according to Chairman William McKay, and the matter of sub-inspectorship will be finally disposed of by Chief Finley being instructed to devote none of his time to enforcement of the Prohibition act except on special application.

Secretary Harkness Here

The New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance is taking further steps toward organization for the referendum on the question of provincial prohibition which is expected to take place within a few months. Mr. D. B. Harkness, General Secretary of the Dominion Prohibition Movement and also secretary of the Social Service Council for Manitoba arrived here today to confer with the New Brunswick Executive. Mr. Donald Fraser of Plaster Rock is in the city to attend the meeting which will be held in the office of Mr. W. G. Clark. Besides the provincial referendum, the general situation in Canada will be discussed.

Mr. Harkness will go to St. John tonight and tomorrow will preach in two of the churches of that city.

ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED FOR PEACE CELEBRATION TOMORROW MORNING, AFTERNOON AND NIGHT

Three Bands With Numerous Floats, Cars and Representations

from Various Public Bodies Will March in the Morning—

Horse Racing and Ball Game at Trotting Park in Afternoon

—Band Concert, Water Sports and Fireworks in Evening

—Decorations Already Being Put in Place.

The program for the big peace celebration planned for tomorrow has been handed to the press for publication. A good time is expected for all and all should do their part to make the affair one of the greatest ever put on in this city. No announcement has been made yet as to whom will be the judges and marshals of the parade. This has been left in the hands of Ald. Frank Cooper. It was suggested by several citizens this morning that all citizens be asked to use their voices during the celebration and not fear the consequences. The various stores of the city have done their part with decorations and the window displays are excellent causing passersby to comment favorably on the collections of war relics and souvenirs as well as war pictures and other attractions.

Private and public buildings are generally decorated, bunting, flags and electrical displays being freely used. The Parliament Buildings are particularly well decorated.
