THE DEATH OF
MISS CAVELL WAS
INSTANTANEOUS

Brussels, May 12—The removal of
the remains of Nurse Edith Cavell
for interment in England takes place
on Tuesday, May 13. The body was ex-
humed at Brussels on March 17, placed
in a double coffin of zinc and oak
and conveyed to the Tir National. The
body was found clothed in a black
dress under a blue cloak. A black hat
was also discovered in the coffin. The
body was well preserved and the fea-
tures were perfectly recognizable.

After a funeral service to be con-
ducted in the station hall by Rev. H.
Cahan, the British chaplain, who was
with Nurse Cavell the night before
her execution, the coffin will be en-
trained for Ostend where it will be
placed aboard a British warship for
Dover where the Admiralty will hand
it over to a committee charged with
organizing the funeral in England.

It is understood the exhumation re-
veals that the nurse's death was in-
stantaneous. She was struck by four
bullets, two of which entered the right
side, and two the left, one of the latter
piercing her heart.

BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gift Frames.—Rub with a
sponge moistened with turpentine.

Drive Away Ants.—A little quick
lime placed in the infested places.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it
well with turpentine till every trace
is removed.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Satur-
ate it with castor oil; to stop shoes
squaking, drive a peg into the middle
of the sole.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a
mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda
1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with
common salt.

Fruit Stains on Hands.—Wash the
hands in clear water, dry slightly and
while still moist strike a sulphur
match and hold your hands around the
flame.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little ben-
zine into a basin and wash the gloves
in it, rubbing and squeezing them un-
til clean. If much soiled, they must
be washed again through clean ben-
zine and rinsed in a fresh supply.
Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a lit-
tle soda in warm water and pour in a
small amount of ammonia. Hold the
brushes with the bristles downward
and avoid wetting the back as far as
possible; shake until the grease is re-
moved; then rinse in cold water and
put in the air to dry.

Remove Stains from Linen.—Wet
the part stained and lay on it some
salt of wormwood; then rub without
diluting it with more water.

Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops
of refined carbolic acid into an ounce
of rose water; shake well and apply.
(If you hold your breath while a mos-
quito has its bill in you it cannot
withdraw it until you breathe again).

QUEBEC CAN
MANUFACTURE
ITS OWN BOOZE

Ottawa, May 13.—The government's
legislation with regard to prohibition,
of which notice was given at the week
end, confirms the forecasts made from
time to time. It ratifies the prohibi-
tion order in council for a year after
peace is proclaimed, but there is an
amendment which allows the manufac-
ture in any province of any beverage
whose sale the province permits, the
most important clause of the order-in-
council as now to be amended reads:

"No person shall make or manufac-
ture intoxicating liquor or cause in-
toxicating liquor to be made or manu-
factured within the Dominion of Cana-
da after April 1, 1918, provided that
in the case the sale of intoxicating
liquor of any class for beverage pur-
poses is permitted in any province this
regulation shall not apply to the man-
ufacture of such intoxicating liquor in
such province."

As stated, the policy adopted is op-
erative only till a year from the date
when peace is proclaimed. After that,
if not meanwhile, another policy may
be worked out.

The native wine industry of Onta-
rio, not interfered with by the Onta-
rio temperance act, is exempted
from the restrictions, but export from
the province is not permitted.

All interprovincial traffic and all im-
port continues to be barred. If any
province went "wet" to the full ex-
tent, the importation of liquors would
nevertheless be banned, but those
which can be manufactured in the
province would be allowed to be man-
ufactured.

As is well known, the manufacture
of intoxicants comes under the regu-
lation of the Dominion. The sale is
and has been, always a matter for the
provinces to decide. In the amended
legislation this arrangement is per-
petuated. Provinces that are "dry"
will remain dry so far as the Federal
legislation is concerned. No manu-
facture to the contrary will be per-
mitted. To the extent, however, to
which any province may decide to go
"wet" the Dominion government won't
stand in its way.

The legislation will have the first
concrete application in Quebec. That
province recently voted overwhelm-
ingly in favor of licenses for light
beer and light wines. The manufac-
ture of such beverages for sale with-
in the province is now to be permit-
ted. Similarly, the new law will fit
into the result of any referendum in On-
tario or any other provinces by ban-

TIME FOR BAKING.

Beans—8 to 10 hours.
Beef—Sirloin, rare, per lb., 4 to 10
minutes; well done, per lb., 12 to 15
minutes; rolled rib or rump, per lb.,
12 to 15 minutes; long or short fillet,
20 to 30 minutes.
Bread—Medium loaf, 40 to 60 min.
Cake—Plain, 20 to 40 minutes.
Biscuit—10 to 20 minutes.
Sponge Cake—45 to 60 minutes.
Chickens—3 to 4 lbs weight, 1 to
one and a half hours.
Cookies—10 to 15 minutes.
Custards—15 to 20 minutes.
Duck (tame)—40 to 60 minutes.
Fish—6 to 8 lbs., 1 hour.
Gingerbread—20 to 30 minutes.
Graham Gems—30 minutes.
Lamb—Well done, per lb., 15 min.
Mutton—Rare, per lb., 10 minutes,
well done, per lb., 15 minutes.
Pie crust—30 to 40 minutes.
Pork—Well done, per lb., 30 min.
Potatoes—30 to 45 minutes.
Pudding—Bread, rice and tapioca,
1 hour; plum, 2 to 3 hours.
Rolls—10 to 15 minutes.
Turkey—70 lbs., 3 hours.
Veal—Well done, per lb., 20 minutes.

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—
Apply a red hot iron to the head for
a short time, the screw-driver being
applied immediately while the screw
is hot.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a
teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a
quart of water, strain it twice, then
dip the mildewed places in this weak
solution and lay in the sun. If not ef-
fective the first time repeat.
