MONEY VOTED FOR ST. JOHN HARBOR IMPROVEMENTS

Dry Dock Will be Completed During the Summer of 1921—Will Accommodate the Largest Ships in the World—Hon. Mr. Carvell Says a Good Word for the Winter Port—Prohibition Measure Discussed in the House.

Ottawa, May 13—Parliament voted \$750,000 this afternoon for St. John harbor, but not until there had been quite a discussion as to the relative merits of St. John and Halifax harbors. Hon. Frank Carvell, Minister of public works said that the St. John dry-dock, which will accommodate the largest ships afloat in the world today will probably be completed in the summer of 1921 and added that St. John harbor would be one of the finest in Canada when it was completed. "It is a costly development, but geographically it is in the place where most of the business is being done," asserted the minister. "The people of St. John deserve great credit. They had the courage to make it a National port and to plan for the trans-Atlantic business."

Put Up Over \$2,000,000
"They have put up over two million dollars themselves and the Dominion government has done less for the port of St. John than for any other, and there is more business done there than at any port but Montreal. In the last fiscal year, \$220,000,000 worth of business passed through St. John port and \$175,000,000 the year before. That it is the natural port of Canada in the winter time and it is my duty and the duty of any man holding the position of the minister of public works to see that the port of St. John is played fairly with and not hand the business over to Portland or Boston. My only apology is to the people of St. John that I am asking parliament for so little. Notwithstanding all the war business that has passed through the port of Halifax, the port of St. John has done a far greater business in the last few years."

Mr. D. D. McKenzie—"The three greatest ports in the world are Halifax Sydney and Melbourne and the greatest of the three is Halifax."

Steel Merger Question
Ottawa, May 13—Mr. A. R. McMaster at the opening of the house today referred to a statement in the financial times which in effect said that Sir Robert Borden had communicated with the Dominion Iron & Coal Company to advise them that they were not to amalgamate with the Nova Scotia Steel Company. Further, it was stated that this action on the part of Sir Robert Borden had been suggested, if not insisted upon, by the British government. Mr. McMaster wanted to know if it were true that if the British government had taken this position of advising Sir Robert Borden, what should be done in connection with Canadian local affairs. If this were true, Mr. McMaster asked how it could be reconciled with loud protestations of growth in Canadian nationality made by members of the government.

No Interference
Sir Thomas White replied that it was not at all likely that the British government should have taken such a step and to his knowledge the British government had not interfered in any way with matters of purely Dominion jurisdiction. So Mr. McMaster could ease his mind on that aspect of the question. Furthermore, Sir Thomas added it was not within his knowledge that the prime minister had recently communicated in any way with the Dominion Iron or the Nova Scotia Steel Co. regarding the matter in question. The matter received some attention during the war when it was thought inadvisable that the control of the industry should pass from Canadian hands. "So far as I am concerned," said Sir Thomas, "that would be my position today."

Forest Reserves Act
Third reading was also given to the bill to amend the dominion forest reserves and park act. The house then went into committee on the resolution of the minister of trade and commerce which provides that packages or closed receptacles containing human food, or any other commodity manufactured or sold in Canada shall be plainly marked with the name and address of the filers and weight or quantity of the contents.

Hon. A. K. MacLean explained that the bill was practically the same as that which had passed the house of commons last year, but for some reason was defeated in the senate. Certain features which had proven objectionable to the senate were left out. The resolution was passed and a bill based upon it was given first reading. Third reading was given to the \$350,000,000 appropriation bill. Sir Thomas White stated that he was informed by the finance department that the government could borrow only about \$200,000,000 under this bill. The reason for this was that it had overborrowed on other war appropriation acts and this over-borrowing must be deducted from the total sum provided for in the present bill. It was probable that legislation providing for further borrowings would be introduced.

Prohibition Measure
Sir Thomas White's resolution on which the prohibition legislation will be based, was passed, and several hours were spent in considering public works department estimates.

The allowance by Ontario of the sales of native wines proved to be a bone of contention in connection with the consideration of the resolution to extend the orders-in-council relative to prohibition for another year with certain modifications in recognition of provincial temperance enactments.

Hon. Mr. Cronyn, of London, regarded as extraordinary the Ontario legislation which permits the sale of native wines without specifying strength and moved an amendment, which, had it been adopted would have placed native wines in the same class as other intoxicants.

Sir Thomas White explained that the principle underlying the bill is the recognition of provincial rights. The province of Ontario was free to do what it deems to be proper in regard to the manufacture and sale of native wines.

Major G. W. Andrews, Winnipeg Centre, was unequivocally opposed to prohibition declaring that the tormented world was in need of a sedative. Liquor he said, had saved thousands of men from death in the trenches.

Replying to Hon. Dr. Beland the acting prime minister said he intended to amend the proposed legislation so as to allow the importation and transportation of wines of a strength in accordance with the law of the province importing it.

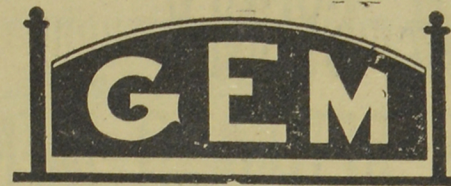
