

FORTY MILE GALE RAGED LAST NIGHT

TREES AND FENCES WERE
DAMAGED CONSIDERABLY

Fire Alarm System Suffered to
Some Extent — Telegraph
Service Was Inter-
rupted, Too.

With a gale of forty miles an hour blowing last evening the sidewalks of Fredericton were littered with dead limbs of trees and pedestrians were in danger of accidents. In several sections of the city fences were blown over and pedestrians narrowly escaped injury. The fence on the St. John Street side of the Agricultural Building was blown completely over and is being put up again today. Several windows in the lower part of the town were broken by dead limbs but as yet no serious accidents have been reported.

About three fifths of an inch of rain fell and with the extreme cold wind this froze in many places. The fire alarm system was damaged several of the wires being pulled down by limbs of trees in falling. As a result of this the fire alarm rang several times about 8.30 o'clock. Repairs are being made today. As far as can be learned no damage was done to telephone wires in the near vicinity of this city. Telegraph wires were down in more distant places.
