ier never saw the front, that returned soldier never saw further than England—that returned soldier was proven otherwise than a deserving character, a fact that cannot be denied.

### The Sheep Purchase.

MR. MURRAY said that before the session ended he proposed to refer to the wonderful purchase of sheep made by his friend the minister of Agriculture. Oh, the wonderful purchase of sheep he had made—the sheep had a resemblance to his hon. friend—they were weak in the knees and weak in the intellect. He proposed to ask how many he purchased and how many he lost. The story was too long to tell to the House, but it would be dealt with at a later date. The purchase of sheep would show how the beautiful Audit Act had worked out in practice and it would show how one man was twice paid for one lot of sheep. That transaction was the work of men who formerly stood up and criticized the old government for being derelict in their duty to the province.

He noticed that His Honor's speech promised legislation arranging for the transfer of branch line railroads to the federal govt. He (Murray) knew of nobody better informed on arrangements of that kind than the hon. premier. All were glad to have the branch railways taken over, but if rumor was correct his hon. friend stood to make a large sum of money out of a road in which he was interested.

HON. MR. FOSTER—Would you like to be in on it?

MR. MURRAY—Yes, if it is a square deal.

HON. MR. FOSTER—I can assure my hon. friend that it is a square deal and in this respect it differs from some other railway transactions in the province.

### Wants McQueen Report.

MR. MURRAY—I would rather stand before the people of this province with my record than with the record of the hon. member for Moncton in connection with railways in which he is interested. Speaking of railway deals and commissions, he noticed that it was set forth in the Speech from the Throne that commissions were appointed to conduct certain investigations, and that the reports would be placed before the House. One commission was composed of the Hon. Minister of Public Works, who was the judge, jury and lord high executioner. Does the government expect a fair report from him? When charges of irregularities in road expenditure were made under the Clarke government they were investigated by an independent commissioner. That was not so under the present government. Then there was the Commission appointed to investigate the so-called "patriotic potato" shipment to Great Britain and the Belgians. The man selected for the work was a close personal friend of the Hon. Minister of Lands and Mines. The report had been completed in December last, and he would like to know why the House and country were not in possession of it. His hon. friend was holding it back because he thought he might be able to make some political capital out of it. He held that the people were entitled to the report and it should be now before the House. Speaking for himself, he had never made a dollar out of the public chest, and he had nothing to fear. He wanted the report, notwithstanding the fact that the enquiry was conducted by a partizan who may not have even written it himself.

### The Bond Issues.

Last session he (Murray) had criticized a government bond issue and the hon. Premier had replied that it was the best ever made by the province. He (Murray) took the ground

that the bonds should have been sold over the counter, but the hon. Premier contended that such a plan was not practicable. Since that the government had made another issue and had followed the very plan which he had proposed and had sold the bonds at par. His hon. friend was on the horns of two dilemmas—he was either wrong last year or he was wrong this year. It would be necessary for him to stand up and tell why he had not got par for the bonds sold last year.

In conclusion, the speaker said that he did not propose to take up further time of the House in dealing with the address. He and his colleagues would have many other matters to refer to before the close of the session. He felt that the people were beginning to realize that the government was carrying on the business of the province in a haphazard manner and not in keeping with recognized business principles.

He believed the people at the first opportunity would condemn the government which had proved itself weak-kneed, incapable and unworthy of public confidence.

HON. MR. FOSTER moved the adjournment of the debate, which was made the order of the day for tomorrow at 3 p.m.

MR. MURRAY (Kings) said that he would raise no objection to a postponement, but merely wished to reiterate what he had previously said, that the Premier wanted an opportunity to consult his financial advisors.

Adjourned at 10.05 p.m.

ceding speaker had said that he had entered the contest alone He (Young) could say that he had entered it not alone but independent. The delegation from the Labor Council had approached him and he had told its members that he was against a commission for permanent paving. The vote had shown that the people were of the same mind. There were no strings on him. He was favorable to the laboring man and until his health had left him he had been a laboring man himself (Applause). Referring to the press he said that all candidates had received a square deal from it in the election. His vote had been but ten votes behind that of Ald. Barker though that gentleman had been in Fredericton thirty years and he but five.

### W. A. Walsh

W. A. Walsh, defeated candidate in Carleton Ward said he had no excuses to offer, no apologies to make, no sins to answer for. He had appealed to the electorate as a product of the city, a native citizen who had made his way in Fredericton and one who tried to do the proper thing by his fellow citizens. He appreciated the vote given him and was not sore. The electors had chosen between Mr. Camp and himself and the winner had his best wishes. It had been a good fight, clean and nice, and he thought that the citizens owed the candidates a debt of gratitude for making a contest. It had been customary to have speech-making after an election. To his mind the time for speech-making was before the contest and not afterward. (Applause) Candidates should speak when placed in nomination.

### Ald. D. J. Shea

Ald. D. J. Shea defeated in Queens Ward said that he was grateful to those who voted for him and also to those who had voted against him for in the future he would be able to devote his time to his own business instead of to that of the city. In three years at the council he had done his best. Like the previous speaker he believed that candidates should express their views on civic matters before an election and not afterward. In his own case there evidently had been a misunderstanding on the part of the public on two matters,—the Street Policy and the Water Rate Increase. It had become quite necessary to increase the rates if the Water Department was to pay its way. Any chairman who did not try to improve conditions would not be doing his duty. A look at the city's accounts would show that in 1917 the Water Department was behind \$6,000. In 1918 it was ahead some \$2,000. That was not all due to the increase in rates for there had been saving in coal and chemicals. For thirty years the plant had been operating and it had not paid anything of the principal. Within ten years the city must install a new unit at a cost of \$60,000 or \$70,000. To his opponent he offered his heartiest congratulations and hoped that his stay at the council would be as pleasant as that of the speaker.
