

## CITY COUNCIL TO ORGANIZE ON THURSDAY

### NEW CHAIRMAN TO BE APPOINTED THEN

Administration of Justice and  
Water Committees Must  
Have New Heads—  
Other Changes.

The Fredericton City Council will meet Thursday night for the purpose of swearing in the aldermen elected at their recent election and for organizing for the ensuing year. The members to be sworn in are Ald. Judson Barker, re-elected; Ald. R. J. Baxter, elected by acclamation; Ald.-elect C. C. Camp; Ald.-elect H. M. Young; Ald. J. A. Reid, elected by acclamation.

#### New Chairmen Necessary

New chairmen of committees will be necessary on account of Ald. Walker and Ald. Shea no longer being members of the City Council. Ald. Walker was chairman of the Administration of Justice Committee and Ald. Shea, of the Water Committee. Both were well suited to the offices and to replace them there will have to be a readjustment of the other chairmanships. Ald. Burpee's name has been mentioned in connection with the Water Committee chairmanship but nothing definite has been decided. It also is uncertain what chairmanships will go to the two aldermen-elect, Messrs. Camp and Young.

#### Mayor Out of City

His Worship Mayor Hanson is absent from Fredericton having left last night for Ottawa as one of a delegation which will support the proposal to extend the York & Carleton Railway from Stanley to Napudogan and make it part of the C. N. R. freight route to St. John. He will return in time to be present at Thursday night's meeting. The appointment of a city engineer is also to be considered at that meeting.

#### In the City Today

Lieut. B. A. Burden, Adjutant of the Dispersal Station, at St. John, is in the city today comparing the work of the Casualty Section in this city, with that of St. John.

#### Late John D. Yerxa

The funeral of the late John D. Yerxa took place this afternoon at two o'clock from his home at Mouth Keswick. Service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Brown, interment being made at Keswick.

#### Arrived With R. C. R.

Major J. H. A. Lyne Evans who was stationed here with the Royal Canadian Regiment prior to the war, arrived at Halifax with that corps. He was on staff duty for a time but returned to his old regiment.

#### Weekly Roll Off

The weekly roll-off took place last evening at the Palace Bowling Alleys with twenty-four bowlers taking part. Wallace McAdam won out with a total of 289, K. McKiel coming second with a total of 278 and Pte. Astles third with a total of 277.

#### Names Struck Off

Mr. R. H. Simonds, Secretary of the Patriotic Fund, stated today that about fifteen names had been struck off the list of those receiving the full benefit of the Patriotic Fund. These names had been removed the first of March and more will follow.

#### Liquor Case Adjourned

Information was laid against George B. Moore as a result of a recent raid on his livery stables, and the case was to have come before the Police Magistrate this morning, but owing to the absence of counsel for the defence it was adjourned until next Thursday.

## TWO NEW MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL RESULT OF ELECTION FOR THREE SEATS YESTERDAY

Ald. Judson Barker, C. C. Camp and Harold M. Young Successful Candidates—Robt. B. VanDine, William A. Walsh and Ald. D. J. Shea Defeated—Increase in Water Rates Aided Materially in Defeat of Ald. Shea—Ald. Barker Led the Poll—Small Vote Cast.

The civic election yesterday resulted in the choice of two new aldermen and the return of a member of the old City Council. The aldermen who successfully stood for re-election were Ald. Judson Barker in Wellington Ward. The other successful candidates were Council C. Camp in Carleton Ward and Harold M. Young in Queen's Ward. Those who met defeat were Ald. D. J. Shea in Queen's Ward a member of the council offering for re-election, W. A. Walsh in Carleton Ward and Robert B. VanDine in Wellington.

#### Result of Polling

The results by polling places were as follows:

Ald. Judson Barker, City Hall 260, Court House 173—Total 433.  
R. B. VanDine, City Hall 155, Court House 138—Total 293.  
C. C. Camp, City Hall 280, Court House 144—Total 424.  
W. A. Walsh, City Hall 137, Court House 165—Total 302.  
Harold M. Young, City Hall 267, Court House 156—Total 423.  
Ald. D. J. Shea, City Hall 147, Court House 161—Total 308.

#### Features of Contest

The outstanding feature of the election was the slight interest taken in it as shown by the small vote which was brought out. Of 1,246 electors qualified to take part in the election there were few more than seven hundred who cast their ballots. Ald. Barker led the poll and but one vote separated Ald.-elect. Camp from Ald.-elect Young. The successful candidates ran within a few votes of one another and the same was true of the three defeated candidates. Although endorsed by the Fredericton Labor Council together with Ald. Barker and Mr. Young, Mr. Walsh was not given the vote which was received by the other men. The other three candidates ran without endorsement by any public body. Both aldermen-elect are in the livery stable business with Mr. Young also conducting a hotel.

#### Against Independent Commission

The result of the election cannot be taken as anything but an expression of opinion against the suggestion that an independent commission be created to administer the scheme for permanent paving which has been suggested. In the speech-making which

followed that fact was mentioned.

#### Ald. Shea's Defeat

The defeat of Ald. Shea came rather as a surprise especially by so large a majority. Ald. Shea during three years at the City Council was a good alderman and as chairman of the Water Committee did some very necessary work in connection with the Pumping Station. His defeat largely resulted from the fact that while he was chairman the water-rates were advanced twenty-five per cent. He claimed that this was necessary to meet increased cost of operation and his view was taken by the council as a whole. The ratepayers, however, evidently thought otherwise.

Mr. VanDine's showing evidently was due to insufficient canvass. Speech-making took place in the Opera House after the declaration of the result of the poll by City Clerk G. R. Perkins. Ex-Mayor Moses Mitchell was chairman.

#### Ald. Judson Barker

Ald. Judson Barker was the first speaker. His address was brief. He thanked the electors for the magnificent vote given him which had placed him at the head of the poll. During his term at the City Council he had done his best for the citizens of Fredericton and he would continue to do so.

#### Ald.-Elect C. C. Camp

Ald.-elect C. C. Camp expressed his gratitude for the noble vote given him. He would put forth every effort on behalf of all classes of citizens. He would always be open to suggestions and never would be too old to learn. He had entered the contest alone. No board or no organization had given him endorsement which perhaps in three months time would hamper his action. His opponent he considered lucky for he saw trouble ahead. (Laughter) There would be criticism and fault-finding. He wished the electors to remember that the errors which he no doubt would make would not be through intention.

#### Ald.-Elect H. M. Young

Ald. elect H. M. Young thanked the electorate. His stand on civic matters was well known. When his card had gone in the press he had stated plainly that he was against the commission which they were trying to put in to handle permanent paving. The pre-
