## A HOMELY PICTURE.

The New Glasgow Chronicle, the editor of which is a staunch Presbyterian, does not like the picture of Rev. Dr. John Pringle, the new moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly, which has been going the rounds of the Canadian Press, and in a recent issue it says:

"Since the elevation of the 'Lieut. Col. (Rev.) John Pringle, D.D.' (observe that the biographer places Rev. in brackets, which is perhaps as it should be in this instance) his photo has been distributed to many newspapers in Canada. The head in the photo is surmounted by a sort of military cap which strangely affects the ensemble of homeliness of the picture. The genius who invented this particular head covering deserves a lower dungeon in the penitentiary for life. There is no denying that this cap might possibly adorn some features, but it is beyond it to beautify the cardinal points of the features of this militant disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ now Moderator of the Presbyterian Church. And, too, there is no denying that military clothing becomes a fighting man on a military front; but surely it is not in place in an assembly of peaceable clergymen, met together to further the mission of the meek and lowly Jesus. However, we daily pray that the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada would dress himself in minister's clothes, would come to the feast of the Lord in 'wedding garments,' and of this particular guest we must say that in this garish array his is the homeliest picture we have ever seen in print."

## NOT SO BADLY OFF.

While the Germans are sobbing about the harsh terms of the treaty of peace, especially its economic provisions, and are claiming that Germany is doomed to economic and industrial death, never to rise again to enter the competition of world trade, the New York Herald points out that the American manufacturers of dyes have laid evidence before the Ways and Means Committee at Washington to the effect that Germany has now ready for export \$400,000,000 worth of dyes to sell in the markets of the world. With England and France closed to these dyes, there is no other place to dump them, but in the United States and the Orient.

So the committee has agreed to report a bill providing for a license system of import, in addition to the regular ad valorem tariff duty, in order to protect American dye producers from German competition. Aside from the wisdom or unwisdom of this provision, the significance of the situation to the average man, as the Herald says, is the anomaly arising from Germany's sob on the one hand and the evidence in Washington on the other.

The former Crown Prince has made his "escape" from Holland and is now back in Germany. It is said that he may place himself at the head of the German military party and start in to make trouble for the Allies. Although the Germans have consented to sign the peace treaty unconditionally, that does not mean that they have any intention of living up to its provisions. The Germans in the past have regarded peace treaties as a mere "scrap of paper" and there is nothing to show that they will regard the present treaty in any different light. That some sort of a Hunnish game is being planned there is not the slightest doubt in the world.

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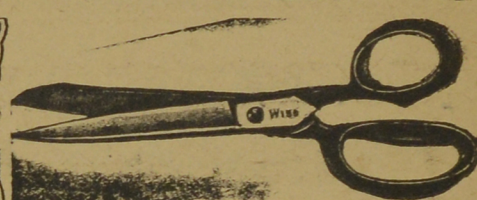
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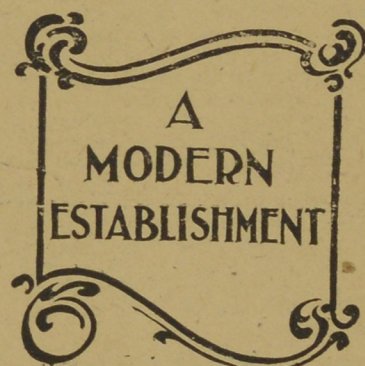
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
