UNITED GRAIN GROWERS COMPANY UNDER PROBE

Witnesses Give Evidence Before the High Cost of Living Committee—Hon. T. A. Crerar Drew No Salary as President While Holding the Portfolio of Minister of Agriculture—Was Entitled to the Sum of \$15,000 a Year.

Ottawa, June 27—Rice Jones, general manager of the United Grain Growers' Company of Winnipeg was the chief witness this morning before the Cost of Living Commission of the House of Commons. He stated that the company was organized in 1906, with an authorized capital of \$5,000,000. Up to August, 1918, \$2,891,050 stock was issued of which \$2,159,763 was paid up. He said the directors were all farmers. Each member of the company was only allowed to own one hundred shares at \$25 each.

Witness said that Hon. T. A. Crerar was president. His salary was \$15,000 but he had not drawn this while at Ottawa and was Minister of Agriculture. When he returns to the company his salary would resume.

R. A. Pringle, K. C., remarked that this was very creditable yet Mr. Crerar was drawing a much smaller salary as a cabinet minister.

Mr. Jones said that Mr. Crerar had thought it was not entirely fair that he should draw his salary as president of the company while he was acting as a minister. He said that Mr. Crerar for a short time at first when he became minister had drawn his salary, but he thought that he would be only a short time at Ottawa. When he found that he would be some time he took the action he did.

Mr. Pringle expressed admiration for Mr. Crerar's attitude.

Mr. Jones stated that the company in 1917 had a turnover of \$2,416,776 on coal, flour and apples and made a profit of \$170,495 or 7.05 per cent gross. On other supplies the turnover was \$1,631,044 and the gross profit 11.05 per cent. On machinery the turnover

was \$1,292,359 the gross profits were 21.06 per cent; and on lumber the turnover was \$747,540, while the gross profits was 11.49 per cent.

The higher salaries paid were: General Manager Rice Jones, \$13,000; G. S. Murray, \$11,000; E. S. McRori, \$5,200, and the secretary \$5,000.

Ten Per Cent Last Year

Mr. Jones stated that the company had paid a dividend of ten per cent last year. On averages in grain they had made two-fifths of one per cent in five years. Occasionally a car came in with nothing off but there was a dockage on practically every car, usually one per cent up.

On elevator value and working capital they had made from twelve per cent to fifteen per cent over a number of years.

Big Boot Profits

Ottawa boot and shoe retailers were examined by the Cost of Living Commission of the House of Commons yesterday.

E. Letellier said that a month ago a shoe costing \$5.75 was now \$6.50. He sold it for \$9.50. He started business in 1914 and last year his turnover was \$51,852. His overhead expenses were \$10,852. He and his brother-in-law received salaries of \$2,400 each and they had left a profit of \$2,619.

Witness said that on one line of shoes he paid the manufacturer \$8.10 and sold them for \$12; on another line he bought them for \$6.75 and sold them for \$11.

Remarking that he kept a large staff for such a small turnover, Mr. Pringle said Mr. Letellier was making an average of sixty per cent, on the shoes he bought from Wright for instance.
