MARRIAGE  
AN AFFAIR  
OF BARTERMarriage Markets in All Large  
Hun Towns Where Betrothals are Arranged or Settled.

London, Feb. 18.—A writer in the Daily Mail says: Marriage in the land of Kultur has ever been a sordid affair of barter. In all large German towns there are certain places and certain days where and when members of the middle and well-to-do classes assemble for the purpose of arranging betrothals.

Army officers heavily in debt, rouses whose health has been ruined by debauchery, manufacturers threatened with bankruptcy, merchants and officials in monetary difficulties—all of these seek matrimonial partners suitable for their particular requirements. Such assemblies are aptly known as "marriage markets."

In Germany it is absolutely necessary that a woman desiring a husband should possess a dot, and the larger the dot the better chance she has of finding the man. Money will always compensate the German for any defect of physique or character; and the unsatisfactory state of affairs arising out of these ill-assorted and sordid unions is indicated in statistics. For the period 1879-1907 the number of divorce petitions in the Fatherland was 20,340, as against 965 in England for the period 1900-1910.

## Matrimonial "Ads."

But not all German marriages are arranged in the "markets." The advertisement columns of the Press also afford useful media. Frequently these matrimonial advertisements are the only items of humor appearing in the Berlin principal news sheets; but no German deems them humorous.

The Teuton father, too has often a graceful touch in advertising an unneeded daughter. Thus a notification from the Berliner Tageblatt:

I have an excellent daughter to marry, who refused many good offers, when young. She is now 29, and I would give a good dowry to a suitable husband, a tradesman if possible, or well-to-do artisan if pious and adverse from alcohol.

What one wonders would an Englishwoman (confessing to 29) have to say if she found that her parent had advertised the fact that she was no longer young; and what sort of a reception would await the pious teetotal workman when he presented himself?

A GOOD WIFE ONE OF THE  
BLESSINGS OF THIS LIFE

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Reply to the Congratulations of Newspaper Men on the Occasion of His Golden Wedding—His Wife Had Been an Inspiration and Comfort to Him in All Their Days of United Happiness.

(Toronto News).

Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier's golden wedding anniversary, May 13, 1918, was happily marked by a shower of flowers, by letters and telegrams of congratulations from all parts of Canada, and by the presentation on behalf of Sir Wilfrid's followers in Commons and Senate of a beautiful golden salver, suitably engraved. Members of the Unionist side of the House, including several of the Cabinet Ministers, greeted Sir Wilfrid in the Commons and wished him and his partner in life many more years of happiness.

A stream of carriages burdened with roses carried the city's tributes of affection to the home of the veteran statesman.

Their Excellencies from the Government House were among the first to call at Sir Wilfrid's residence to offer felicitations, and all day long a stream of automobiles and carriages brought people prominent in all walks of life who desired to offer congratulations. Among remembrances sent was a huge bunch of fifty roses from the Parliament Press Gallery.

Sir Wilfrid's reply to the members of the Press Gallery, who waited on him to tender their felicitations, was apt: "Among the greatest blessings of life," he declared, "is the blessing of a good wife. Gentlemen, I have had that blessing for these fifty years. My wife has been a help to me, an inspiration and a comfort, a good soldier alike in prosperity and adversity, probably greater in the latter than in the former."

"A suggestion that appears to be most in favor is that the Parliamentary Liberal Party, in addition to any other joint action that may be taken should mark the event by having you and Lady Laurier as their guests at an informal dinner to be attended by the Liberal members and Senators, and the ladies of their families, and that this dinner should be followed by a reception, so as to give your friends in general an opportunity to offer their felicitations."

"The undersigned, on behalf of their Liberal colleagues in the Senate and the House of Commons beg to acquaint you with the proposal about to be put in hand, and trust that it will meet with your approval."

"My Dear Bostock,—I have your favor of the 25th inst., for which I pray you to accept my thanks."

"My wife and I would much prefer that the day should pass without any celebration at all."

"Accept for yourself, my friend McKenzie and all our friends the expression of our sincere gratitude."

"Believe me ever, yours very sincerely,

Berlin, Feb. 15.—The mistress of the German presidential residence is a comely "Hausfrau" of medium height and slender who up to this time has always attended to her own household duties done the family cooking and has even been her own dressmaker.

Frau Luise Ebert, wife of the president of the new German republic was born 45 years ago in a workman's home in Bremen. She views her new social environment with resignation.

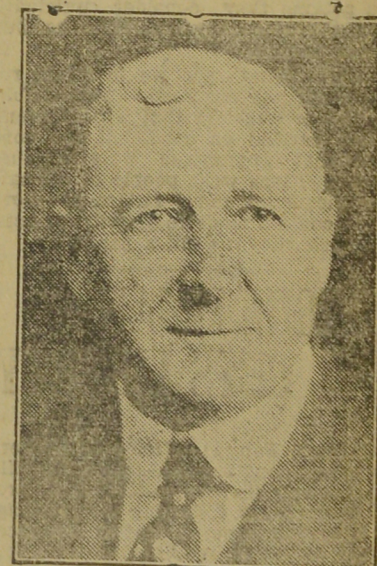

The question of official receptions is already worrying certain circles who contemplate with concern the shift from the royal splendor to the threatened Jeffersonian simplicity of Ebert.
