THOUSANDS VIEW REMAINS OF THE LATE SIR WILFRID

Body of Illustrious Statesman Now Lying in State in the Commons Chamber—His Vacant Chair Draped in Mourning Colors—Wreath of Roses Placed on the Casket by Order of the King and Queen—Opening of Parliament.

Ottawa, Feb. 20—Overshadowing the opening of what may possibly be the last session of the present parliament today, subduing the greetings of reunion among the members and taking first thought in men's minds in the ceremonial and circumstances of the day was the presence of Parliament's loss in the passing of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The vacant chair of the old chief draped in purple and black with the opposition members' tribute of roses and lilies on the desk in front of it was the centre of interest, comment and reminiscence. Parliament will pay the last formal tribute to the deceased—its most distinguished member on Tuesday next. Today every member, irrespective of politics gave a place in conversation and thought to him.

The funeral drapings of the chamber cast a subdued light harmonizing with the unusual quietness and reverence of the brief opening sitting. After the house adjourned the chamber was cleared of chairs and desks, the blinds were drawn and the hundreds of floral tributes to Sir Wilfrid were brought in and banked in a great circle round the place reserved for the bier in the central point between opposition and government sides opposite the speaker's chair.

Lady Laurier Accompanied Body At 6 o'clock the hearse bearing the mortal remains arrived at the front entrance of the building. The bronze casket was borne to its resting place where it will remain until Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. With the relatives and immediate family friends who drove behind the hearse from Sir Wilfrid's late residence to the parliament building was Lady Laurier. She did not enter the building with her physician in her carriage. She had made the last journey with "Her boy" over the long frequent route from home to parliament.

"I always used to drive down with him," she is reported to have said. "I will do it this time again for the last time." She bore with her a basket of sweet peas, her own floral offering to be placed on the casket.

Soon after the bier had been placed in position, His Excellency the Governor-General with the Duchess of Devonshire and his aides followed by the members of the cabinet, the honorary pall bearers and the members of parliament filed into the chamber for a last look at the departed chief. His excellency carried with him and placed upon the bier, a great wreath of red roses on behalf of Their Majesties, the King and Queen.

At eight o'clock this evening when the building was opened to the public there was a line of some thousands of people extending for blocks along the street waiting the opportunity to enter the building and pass in sad procession through the chamber for a moment's final gaze upon the recumbent figure at rest.

Six dominion police stood guard, three on each side of the casket. During the evening several thousands passed in quiet and reverent procession.

All day yesterday at the late residence on Laurier avenue there had

been a similar constant stream of citizens in all walks of life the total number who passed in and out during the day being estimated at more than 15,000.

No Invitations Issued

Parliament opened "in the shadow of a great loss." Over the building the flag was flying at half-mast, the corridors and galleries of the house were hung with crepe. On Sir Wilfrid's desk there were as Sir Thomas White expresses it, "the floral tokens of affection."

The usual social character of the opening ceremony was lacking. No invitations had been issued. The gathering in the senate chamber when the governor-general read the speech from the members of the two houses.

In the commons, Dr. Beland took his seat for the first time after four years imprisonment in Germany.

The speech from the throne promised reconstruction measures mainly along expected lines. There will be provision for soldiers settlement on the land; for promoting immigration and farm settlement; for the promotion of vocational education and the better housing conditions. The promise of a franchise bill, with provision to give to women the right to sit in parliament awakened more than usual interest. There is also a bill to create a department of public health.

Proceedings in the house were brief. Sir Thomas White, acting prime minister, presented a formal motion that Sir Wilfrid should be accorded a public funeral and referred in a few words to the loss to the house. The motion was seconded by Dr. Reid and carried. Mr. Robb on behalf of the opposition adding a few words in tribute to his late leader.

Out of respect to Sir Wilfrid's memory the house adjourned till Tuesday afternoon. Then tribute will be paid to his memory.

Afterwards the debate on the address will begin.
