**LARGEST HOTEL
IN THE WORLD**
 (New York Sun)

The Hotel Pennsylvania which it is
 announced will open Sunday, will have
 the distinction of being the largest
 hotel in the world, having 2,200 guest
 rooms and 2,200 baths. The new hotel
 which is opposite the Pennsylvania
 Station, will be managed by the Hotel
 Statler Company, Inc., which operates
 the Statler hotels in Buffalo, Cleveland
 Detroit and St. Louis.

E. M. Statler, head of the company
 which is to operate the Pennsylvania
 Hotel is one of the world's best known
 hotel men. His "Statler Service
 Codes" a compilation of epigrammatic
 instructions to his employees, have
 been much commented on by the trade
 press and have since been issued in
 the form of a booklet. The "codes"
 are replete with such truisms as:
 "Snap judgments of men are of-
 times faulty."
 "A man may wear a red necktie, a
 green vest and tan shoes and still be
 a gentleman. The unpretentious man
 with the soft voice may possess the
 wealth of Croesus. The stranger in
 cowhide boots, broadbrim and rusty
 black hat may be president of a rail-
 road or a senator from over the ridge."
 He sums up the hotel's attitude to-
 ward tips in this manner:

**NEW BRUSWICK
SONG WRITER IS
COMPLIMENTED**
 (Moncton Transcript)

The Canadian Courier of Jan. 18
 contains a photograph of Mr. Albert
 E. MacNutt, of this city, along with
 a complimentary paragraph concern-
 ing his popular songs. It says:—
 "Only recently has Canada develop-
 ed any song-writers of note. The war
 gave Canada a chance to produce her
 own popular songs. Now 'We'll Never
 Let the Old Flag Fall,' 'Good Luck to
 the Boys of the Allies,' 'When Your
 Boy Comes Back to You,' 'Keep Your
 Head Down Fritzie Boy,' are known
 not only in Canada but throughout the
 United States and England as well."

"The stories of some of these songs
 make interesting reading. 'We'll Never
 Let the Old Flag Fall' happened in
 this way. Mr. Albert E. MacNutt was
 standing in line at a recruiting office
 in his native city just after war had
 been declared. Things looked pretty
 black just then.

"I wonder what is going to become
 of the British Empire. It looks as if
 we're up against a pretty strong com-
 bination," suggested one of the boys
 who was offering his life to his coun-
 try.

"Well, we'll never let the old flag
 fall," Mr. MacNutt promptly replied.

"Thereupon he turned on his heel
 and left the recruiting depot for his
 home. In one of the attic rooms he
 scribbled on a piece of paper the words
 that have become world famous. At
 the piano he developed the melody
 that has done so much to help Canada
 carry on the great war. Later he took
 his work to Mr. M. F. Kelly, a St.
 John bandmaster, who arranged the
 music for publication. Mr. Kelly died
 of lung trouble not long after the
 song was published.

"The song made fair headway and
 grew in popularity steadily. But one
 day Mr. Cully Ross, who arranges the
 programme before the Grand Stand at
 the Canadian National Exhibition,
 walked into a Toronto store looking
 for a suitable song for the great spec-
 tacle of 1915. He paid 15c for a copy
 of 'We'll Never Let the Old Flag Fall.'
 The result was that hundreds of thou-
 sands heard the biggest production any
 song ever had in Canada. Soon the
 Canadian record of 45,000 copies was
 left far behind and then the 100,000
 mark too.

"Who can doubt but that Albert Mac-
 Nutt did more to help win the war by
 giving us this song than by even
 shouldering a rifle, had his physical

**EARLY HATCHED PULLETS
ARE THE MOST PROFITABLE**

Chicks Should be Out of the Shell in March or April—Must be
 Fully Developed Before Cold Weather Sets in in the Fall—
 Eggs Should be Collected Frequently at This Season of
 the Year to Insure Their Fresh Condition.

(Experimental Farms Note)

From records kept at the Experi-
 mental Farm, Nappan, as well as
 throughout the Experimental Farm
 system, it is evident that the early hat-
 ched pullets are by far the most pro-
 fitable ones. For they are producing
 eggs at that period of the year when
 the demand is greatest and the high-
 est prices realized.

This is an important factor in suc-
 cessful poultry raising. When one con-
 sider the high prices paid for all
 feeding material the object should be
 to produce pullets that would lay dur-
 ing the winter months in order to re-
 duce to a minimum the cost of main-
 taining the flock through the most ex-
 pensive period in the year.

Now the question arises "Can early
 chicks be produced in the Maritime
 Provinces successfully? The answer
 is "Yes". But in order to do so the
 poultryman must start with the par-
 ent stock that is, with the flock that
 is to produce the eggs.

The fertility of the egg and also the
 vitality of the germ must be kept up
 to its maximum if the best results
 are to be obtained. This can be done
 only by judicious feeding and careful
 attention to the flock that the birds
 lacking in vigor and health will pro-
 duce chicks low in vitality. Such
 chicks will not withstand the ex-
 tremes in weather conditions experi-
 enced in these provinces during the
 early spring.

The eggs should be collected promp-
 tly before they become chilled and
 stored in a room where the tempera-
 ture is about 55 to 60 degrees, avoid-
 ing extreme cold or heat. Best results
 are obtained where eggs can be set
 from two to three days after they are
 laid and should not be kept longer
 than one week, especially for early
 hatches.

All incubators should be thoroughly
 disinfected and cleaned before the
 eggs are set and an even and normal
 temperature kept throughout the pe-
 riod. If hens are used for setting they
 should be in a good healthy condition
 and free from lice; otherwise they will
 be uneasy and perhaps leave the nest
 and allow the eggs to get chilled.
 Greatest care and attention should be
 given them during this period.


When chicks are hatched artificially
 they should be put into a clean, warm
 brooder where the temperature will
 be from 95 to 100 degrees. They re-
 quire plenty of fresh air and as they
 grow older they need all the sunshine
 possible. Unfortunately there is very
 little at this time of the year. With
 hen hatched chicks, put the hen in a
 coop and place it in a comparatively
 warm place for the cold weather.

Have plenty of clean, wholesome
 feed for chicks. Dried bread crumbs
 is an excellent feed to start on; plenty
 of milk may be given at all times,
 green feed in the form of sprouted
 oats or such like is most essential for
 young growing chicks. Don't feed too
 much of any kind of feed at one time
 just what they will clean up in a few
 minutes, but feed little and often es-
 pecially during the first few weeks.

Just as soon as the ground is dry
 enough and the days are warm and
