## WHAT ARE THEY DOING?

The Toronto Saturday Night says that Mr. Herbert C. Hoover, U. S. food controller, is the greatest commercial traveller the world has ever seen. At the present time Mr. Hoover is in France busily engaged in booking big orders for foodstuffs for American packers. He is quoted as saying: "Give me your orders. How many million dollars' worth of food do you want? Never mind the money, just sign here. We will finance it for you."

In commenting on Mr. Hoover's activities, the Saturday Night says:

"It might be timely to inquire what our 'bright young men,' as Sir Joseph Flavelle would say, are doing over in Europe. Goodness knows, enough of them went over. If I recollect rightly, there must have been pretty nearly a shipload, headed by Sir Robert Borden and Sir George Foster, erstwhile Minister of Trade and Commerce, but now greatly taken with the idea of sitting on the steps at Versailles, or possibly walking up and down in the orangery, while matters of state are being discussed by those who have a real interest in the topic. Anyhow, Sir George is not interested in such vulgar things as the price of bacon, or wheat products, and as to whether there is an opportunity to sell some to the hungry Roumanians or starving Poles. He is a real—I was going to say a live—delegate to a Peace Conference, so what does it matter if Mr. Hoover does have shipped from the United States everything there is to sell, and we ship nothing? However, this would probably appear to be but a mere detail to such statesmen as Sir Robert and Sir George. And, besides, Sir Robert has taken occasion to warn the fellow members of his cabinet—that is, the precious few who remained at home—that he must not be bothered with any such details. It took, he said, his mind off the real work at the Peace Conference."

In regard to Sir George Foster, it will be remembered that soon after his arrival in England he was invested with a title by His Majesty the King. At last accounts the other "bright young men" composing the Canadian contingent had not received any titles, but were living in hope. All are busily engaged with big things that they are unable to find time to bother their heads looking for business for Canada.

New York Herald: Germany is not going to be admitted to the league of nations until she has paid in large measure the damages and indemnities which will be demanded and exacted from her and until the people of the country show a very different attitude from that which they have manifested so far. They have got to get rid of that arrogantly nonsensical idea of an unbeaten army and navy and to realize that the crimes committed against Belgium, France and other countries must be admitted and atoned for partly by a display of becoming humility and penitence.

Australian wheat is now quoted at \$1.18 per bushel. The price in Canada was last year fixed by the government at \$2.24 per bushel. As there is still a large quantity of last year's wheat in western elevators, it looks as if the government may have to make good the difference in price to the farmers. Canadian wheat will come into competition with Australian wheat when placed on the English market.

Thirty-six states of the American Union, the necessary three-fourths, have certified to the State Department their ratification of the Federal prohibition amendment and preparation of a proclamation to make the amendment effective has been ordered.

Mr. W. E. Stavert, at one time manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, and afterwards with the Bank of Montreal, and more recently director of finance at the British Ministry of Information, has been created a Knight of the Order of the British Empire.

The transport George Washington, which is to bring President Wilson back to the United States on February 12, left Hoboken on Monday afternoon. She will go direct to Brest.

Food prices are still dropping in Chicago. Butter has gone down four cents a pound, and potatoes show a decline of ten cents a bushel.




