## PROVINCIAL POULTRY SHOW MEETING WITH SUCCESS

Visitors Speak in Terms of Praise of the Splendid Exhibition of Fancy and Utility Fowls—Fredericton and Devon Fanciers Show Up Well in the Prize List—Judging Completed Last Evening—Strong Display of Barred Rocks.

The big poultry show which is by long odds the most successful ever held in this city, will close its doors at ten o'clock this evening. Yesterday afternoon there was a steady stream of visitors, including a number from outside points, and they all expressed surprise at the large number of excellent birds on exhibition.

Mr. Richard Oke, completed the judging yesterday afternoon and left this morning for Winnipeg where he is to judge the Manitoba show. Later he will officiate at a mammoth show to be held in the Chicago Coliseum. Mr. Oke's work here gave every satisfaction. Before leaving he was presented by President Ferguson on behalf of the Association with a box of cigars.

### Some Cup Winners

The silver cup donated by Poultry Superintendent A. C. McCulloch of this city for the largest display of utility barred rocks was won by Mr. H. M. McMonagle of Fredericton.

The cup donated by Mr. J. S. Neill of this city was won by Mr. Percy Morgan of North Devon, who had the largest display of white Wyandottes.

Mr. W. S. Bailey of this city won for the second time the silver cup donated by the Dominion Poultry Guide for the best Rhode Island Reds.

The silver cup donated by Reed & Co., of Moncton for the best white Leghorns was won for the second time by Mr. J. N. Ferguson of this city.

### A Newcastle Exhibit

Successful exhibitors from outside points include Mr. G. M. Lake of Newcastle, who has been in attendance at the show. Mr. Lake is showing some high class utility Wyandottes imported from Philadelphia. He captured four first prizes and two seconds on his exhibit.

### Returned Soldiers Exhibit

Among the successful exhibitors is Mr. Joseph Ellick, a returned soldier who is now living on a farm at Nashwaaksis. Mr. Ellick exhibited Plymouth Rocks, Light Brahmas, Toulouse geese and Indian Runner ducks. He took first prize on the ducks, geese and Brahmas and fifth and sixth prizes on his Plymouth Rocks.

Mr. James Stickle of North Devon won the principle cash prizes on his Ancona birds, and he also captured first prize on eggs and four special prizes.

A visitor at the show yesterday declared that some of the birds on exhibition are the handsomest he ever saw. Among those he picked out for special mention were the Blue Orpingtons, the Partridge Cochins, Red Caps, and Indian Cornish. These birds were sent in by Moncton and St. John exhibitors.

There are no less than 120 Plymouth Rock birds on exhibition. About fifty of these are in the exhibition class and the remainder are styles utility birds.

Mr. Bertrand Goodspeed of Penniac has a splendid exhibit of geese and bronze turkeys and carried off the principal prizes in those classes. He also won first prize for dressed poultry.

Mr. W. H. Allen of Penniac who is showing exhibition Barred Rocks, won a prize for a setting of P. R. eggs offered by John E. Page of this city for the best amateur exhibitor.

### The Judge's Impression

Mr. Richard Oke of London who acted as judge has given out the following statement.

"I was very favorably impressed with the high quality exhibited in the leading more popular varieties of poultry at your exhibition now being held. Unfortunately the building in which the show was held was entirely too small and unsuitable to show the exhibit to its best advantage, and the many visitors who patronized the show were inconvenienced accordingly. I understand the Poultry Committee had arranged for a more suitable building with ample room and good light but were turned down at the last minute, the owners contending they could make more money by dancing parties, etc. They may be right, but the hen was a great factor in saving the 'bacon' for many during the past four years of strenuous warfare, when she was called upon to help, and she is going to continue to be a factor, but this is not what I started out to write about, rather the excellent classes of Barred Plymouth Rocks, White Wyandottes, White Leghorns, Rhode Island Reds and many others which could hold their own in competition with the best at our leading shows throughout the country. They had to be seen to be appreciated. The show was well managed and the officers in charge are to be congratulated on the splendid work accomplished."
