

L. S. McLAIN TRANSFERRED TO OTTAWA

TO HAVE CHARGE OF
QUARANTINE WORK

Will Continue to Supervise
Brown Tail Moth Extermination—Leaves for Ottawa Tuesday.

Mr. L. S. McLaine officer in charge of Brown Tail Moth extermination in the Maritime Provinces, with headquarters in Fredericton has been transferred to Ottawa where will be officer in charge of quarantine in the Entomological branch of the Department of Agriculture. He will leave for Ottawa on Tuesday next. Mr. McLaine has been in charge of Brown Tail Moth work in the Maritime Provinces since September 1913. He will continue to exercise supervision over the work in this part of Canada. Mr. J. D. Tothill of the staff of the Dominion Entomological Laboratory in this city will have charge of the work locally. The transfer of Mr. McLaine to Ottawa is in the nature of a promotion.

Will be Greatly Missed

While a resident of Fredericton Mr. McLaine has made numerous friends who will regret his departure to Ottawa. He has been a prominent member of the Science Club and was largely instrumental in its formation and continuation. Tomorrow that organization will meet and will proceed to the U. N. B. Forestry Camp where there will be a special gathering to mark Mr. McLaine's departure from Fredericton.

TEACHERS AGAIN ASK INCREASE IN SALARIES

SCHOOL BOARD PLACED
MEMORIAL ON FILE

Nathaniel Inch Resigns as Janitor of the Smythe Street School—Truants are Numerous.

The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held Wednesday with Dr. VanWart, the chairman presiding. The other members in attendance included Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Cox, Mr. Spurdun, Dr. Crocket, Mr. Lemont, Mr. Hughes, and Mr. Shute. Mrs. Clark who was absent from some of the recent meetings owing to illness, was cordially welcomed back to her seat.

Several matters of importance engaged the attention of the members and the slate was cleared shortly after six o'clock. In his report the secretary explained that the truancy officer was making a little extra effort to round up some of the delinquent pupils, and the flu excuses will not count any more. Parents seem to have allowed their boys in greater numbers than usual to accept appointments where they can earn a dollar, regardless of school or law; this will not be allowed.

The Secretary submitted the annual financial statement showing the receipts and expenditures for 1913. This was referred to Mr. Weddall and Mr. Lemont for audit.

Applications Refused

Letters were read from two of the teachers asking that they be placed in the same category with the four teachers who were recommended at last meeting for an additional fifty dollars, in recognition of long service with the Board. However, as the recent applicants had not the long service with the Fredericton Board, and as the recent promise of an additional grant from the City is already exhausted, the request was filed.

Model School

A letter was read from the Chief Superintendent stating that the Board of Education had added the sum of one hundred dollars to the annual salary of the three lady teachers on the staff of the Model School. According to law this means another appropriation from the city School Board's funds.

Again Ask for Increase

Nineteen lady teachers of the city schools staff signed a document addressed to the Trustees, in which they thank the Board for promise of an additional one hundred dollars; but they also call the attention of the Board to the fact that they asked for two hundred.

INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC HAS SUBSIDED

TEMPORARY HOSPITAL
TO CLOSE NEXT WEEK

H. H. Hagerman Continues as Analyst for Board of Health—Isolation Hospital Discussed.

The Board of Health of the City of Fredericton Sub-district met last night and transacted considerable business. The report of Inspector A. C. Fleming was presented and showed that the epidemic of Spanish Influenza was dying out rapidly. The last patient was admitted to the Temporary Hospital with this disease January 14th. He will be discharged within a few days and the hospital will then be closed. Three cases of diphtheria were reported since the last meeting.

Isolation Hospital

The matter of an Isolation Hospital for the city was discussed. The city will be asked to take action in regard to that after May 1st. It has been suggested that an Isolation Hospital for any disease but smallpox could be provided in connection with Victoria Hospital. For smallpox temporary provision could be made.

Analyst Appointed

H. H. Hagerman was appointed official analyst for the Board to continue the work he carried on for the old board. He will analyse samples of milk now being supplied for consumption in Fredericton.

To Test Milk

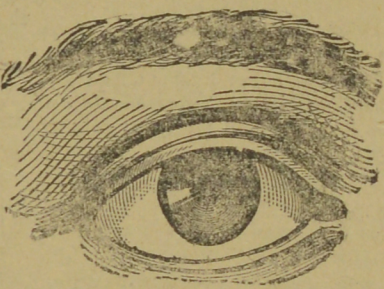
Inspector Fleming will secure samples of milk. The permanent chairman for this sub-district, Dr. J. A. Wade of St. Andrew's has been furnished with a list of the milk-producers who supply the Fredericton dealers. Inspectors in the York County sub-district will be asked to inspect the stables in the county from which the milk comes.

The Temporary Hospital

Miss Loretta McGivney, matron of the Temporary Hospital which was established to take care of influenza and pneumonia cases, presented a report. Since the Temporary Hospital was opened December 20th last, fifteen patients were admitted. Five deaths occurred since that date. For the care of patients the sum of \$106.49 has already been collected and other accounts are outstanding.

Trucking Licenses Taken Out

Two trucking licenses were taken out yesterday and two today by four men who are starting in the trucking business. Up to date 440 automobile licenses have been taken out this year in the Province of New Brunswick, while 287 auto truck licenses have been registered.
