**REMARKABLE STORIES MISSED BY NOVELISTS**

Fiction fails to provide such re-  
markable stories of strange meetings  
as some brought about the war. Twel-  
ve years ago the eldest son of an Eng-  
lish doctor quarrelled with his father  
and emigrated to Canada. He held no  
communication with his family, and  
when war broke out, joined up. A few  
months ago he was badly wounded and  
the doctor who attended him at the  
casualty clearing station proved to be  
his own father, the meeting resulting  
in a happy reconciliation.

The most fertile novelist could  
scarcely have imagined such a case as  
the following. Twin brothers ran away  
from home when they were boys, 27  
years ago, and subsequently quarrel-  
ling, they parted, one settling in Aus-  
tralia, and the other in Africa. Both  
married, and each sent a son to the  
war. The sons were wounded, and lay  
side by side in the hospital without  
knowing they were related to one an-  
other. The Australian's father was in  
England on business, while the South  
African's father came over to see his  
son and met his twin brother at the  
bedside of the wounded boys—and  
shook hands again.

Among other extraordinary similar  
instances which might be cited is that  
of the matron of an auxiliary hospital  
in France, who had quarrelled with her  
daughter six years previously, on ac-  
count of the latter's marriage to a man  
she objected to. The daughter went  
aboard with her husband, who was ul-  
timately killed in the war. She after-  
wards devoted herself to nursing and  
was appointed to the hospital where  
her mother quite unknown to her, was  
matron.

**FRIENDS IN PEACE AS WELL AS IN TIME OF WAR**

(New York Times)  
Captain Carpenter, of the Vindic-  
tive was not wrong—far from it—  
when he said at a dinner of the Eco-  
nomic Club on Monday night that  
"there is a certain amount of in-  
sidious propaganda going about that  
our navies the American and the  
British, did not get along as well to-  
gether as might have been hoped."

As a matter of fact, the propagandists  
have stuck at nothing to provoke ill-  
feeling among the men of the United  
States Navy by disparaging the work  
of the British sailors in the war by  
spreading stories of their treatment  
of the Americans in European waters  
and particularly by lauding the effi-  
ciency and bravery of the Americans at  
the expense of their British allies.  
Doubtless in a subtle way the British  
blue-jackets were tampered with, but  
the opportunities for mischief were  
not as promising in England; there  
propagandists sometimes came to  
grief and a watch was always kept up  
on them.

Since the armistice the sowing of  
discord has been very noticeable in  
this country. Captain Carpenter did  
well to have his say about it. When  
he faced his great audience on Mon-  
day night he used the short and ugly  
word, with a seaman's dash of pro-  
fanity, in characterizing the evil work  
of the enemies of America and Great  
Britain, and he finished by calling as  
a witness Admiral Rodman, who said

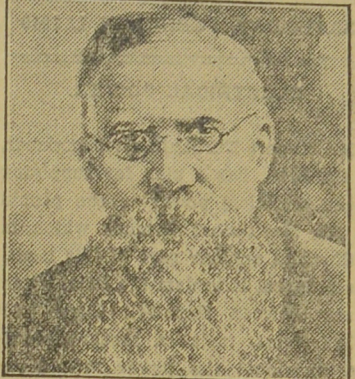

**WAR SAVINGS STAMPS GOOD INVESTMENT**

The paying of \$4 now for a War Sav-  
ings Stamp and getting \$5 for it from  
the government in January, 1924, is a  
method of investing that appeals quite

ings Certificate to which the stamps  
are attached.

A person does not need to have \$4  
in cash in order to take the first steps

ed they may be exchanged for a War  
Savings Stamp. With the first Thrift  
Stamp purchased goes a Thrift Card,  
to which the Stamps should be fixed  
as soon as received.

After the 16 Thrift Stamps have  
been exchanged for a War Savings  
Stamp, the person doing so should  
start in again to buy Thrift Stamps,  
and thus begin saving for the second  
War Savings Stamp.
