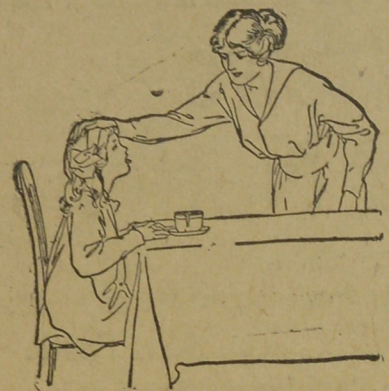


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WOULD PLANT NOXIOUS WEEDS

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 8.—That Industrial Workers of the World had been advised to plant noxious weeds in California fields as a means to offset the prosecution of several of its members charged with murder, was revealed in testimony today at the trial of 46 members of that organization charged with acts of sabotage throughout the west. Testimony to this effect was given by W. Dennis, formerly a member of the organization, now manager of a manufacturing plant at Berkeley, Cal.

WILL ASK PAYMENT OF PART OF EXPENSES OF EPIDEMICS

Board of Health Matters Considered Wednesday Afternoon—Chairman C. N. Goodspeed of the Old Board Presented Report—Methods of Paying Tax Collectors Criticized—Councillor Robert Graham on Immigration.

The Municipal Council of York on Wednesday afternoon received the report of Chairman C. N. Goodspeed of the retiring Board of Health and by paying the outstanding indebtedness of that body some \$675, left the incoming Board with everything clear for a start. The council after Mr. Goodspeed had drawn its attention to the matter appointed a committee to wait upon the Provincial Government and press for a payment of a proportion of expenses incurred during epidemics. The council also devoted much time to discussion of tax collection and the methods of paying collectors. This matter was left over. Coun. Robert Graham also brought up the matter of immigration urging that the problem of securing domestic servants could be solved by bringing a satisfactory class of immigrants from Europe.

Wednesday Afternoon
The Council resumed at 2.30 Wednesday.

Coun. Robert Graham called attention to the fact that there was great scarcity of domestic help in the county. In fact it was much easier to go out and marry a girl than it was to get one as household help. In Europe he believed there was a superabundance of young women and on that account he moved the following resolution:

Resolved by the County Council of the Municipality of the County of York petition the Department of Immigration of New Brunswick re-

questing the department at the earliest possible convenience to furnish the county with suitable domestic help.

Coun. Alex. Brewer seconded the resolution.

The County Solicitor said he did not think the resolution a proper one as the Provincial Government did not deal in domestic help, and had no means of satisfying the demand for domestic employees.

Coun. Graham said he would withdraw the resolution for the time being and amend it with the intention of bringing up the matter later.

Coun. Pat Graham brought up the matter of the Dog Tax. He could not see the need of collecting more money with a large balance lying in the treasury.

The subject was not discussed by other members.

Board of Health Report

Clarence N. Goodspeed chairman of the Board of Health gave a report upon public health conditions and the work of the Board. Receipts had amounted to \$3,016.45 with expenditures of \$2,992.23 and unpaid accounts of \$675. He hoped that a cheque for that amount would be paid so that the new Board of Health could take office with no outstanding indebtedness. He had heard that he was to be named as one of the government appointees on the new Board of Health. He had declined to serve on the Board and regretted that he was to be named. His principal objection to serve was a fear that under the new act the public would not get adequate service for the expenditure which would be incurred. He also drew attention to the fact that the province owed a proportion of the expenditure for epidemics.

On the motion of Coun. Alex. Brewer the report of Mr. Goodspeed was received and the outstanding indebtedness of \$675 ordered to be paid.

Coun. Alex. Brewer also brought up the matter of the share of epidemic expenditures which should be borne by the province and suggested that a committee be appointed to wait on the

government in connection with the matter.

The committee, appointed for the purpose Warden Hallett, Coun. Stairs, Coun. Alex. Brewer and Mr. Goodspeed.

Tax Collections

Coun. Dougan asked if it were permissible to divide a parish for the purpose of tax collection. In the western section of Manners-Sutton the population was sparse and the collection of taxes could not be carried on in future if the collectors' commission could not be increased.

Coun. Fox advocated that the tax collectors should be allowed five per cent of the full amount of taxes and the discount discontinued.

Coun. Seymour strongly supported retaining the discount.

Coun. Everett was of like opinion.

On request the Secretary Treasurer stated that the discount on taxes had caused prompt payment with matters much better for the county as a whole.

Coun. Cowperthwaite pointed out that conditions varied with the parishes. In parishes which had large non-resident assessments the commission was sufficient but in sparsely settled districts with low non-resident assessment the commission of two and a half per cent was too low.

Coun. Pond suggested that the present bylaw be repealed and each parish allowed to set its own collectors' commission.

Further consideration was deferred.

Other Matters

On the motion of Coun. Everett seconded by Coun. Fox it was decided that a bylaw be passed providing that horses turned out on island and have the shoes removed from the hind feet.

Coun. Dougan presented the report of the committee on the Secretary Treasurers accounts which was accepted.

Coun. White brought up the matter of an item of twenty-one dollars for rent at the Loyal Orange Lodge room for use by the exemption board under the Military Service Act.

He was instructed to send a bill to Mr. W. A. Ewing at St. John.

The council adjourned.
