

RETURNED MEN IN MOTOR SMASH AT BAILEY CK.

SAY THEY WERE UNABLE
TO MAKE TURN AT BRIDGE

The Wind-Shield was Smashed and the Occupants of the Car Cut by Flying Glass.

Four returned soldiers had a narrow escape from serious injury or death this morning when the motor-car which they were driving struck the railing of the Bailey Creek Bridge near the Hermitage. The bridge which is within the city limits, is a high one and had the car gone through the railing and into the bed of the stream, death or serious injury would have resulted. As it was the injuries of the men were confined to cuts from the flying glass of the broken windshield.

Said they Could Not Make the Turn

The four soldiers went to the New Brunswick Military Hospital where their injuries were attended to. None was an inmate of the hospital. The men explained the accident by saying that they were unable to make the turn at the western end of the bridge and crashed into the railing. The car was much damaged. The names of three of the men are Morehouse, Co-man and Tait.

MEN FROM NORTH RUSSIA AMONG LATE ARRIVALS

SEVERAL LEFT HERE WITH
2ND DIVISION BATTERIES

Expect to Reach Fredericton Tonight—Bdr. Karl Walker Coming—Gnr. Chas. Colwell, D. C. M.

A large number of soldiers from Fredericton and vicinity arrived from England aboard the Carmania which arrived at Halifax Saturday night. They were at St. John yesterday and many arrived in this city this morning. Others are expected tonight. Several of those who arrived on the Carmania served with the Northern Russia expedition on the Murman coast and in the vicinity of Archangel. The remainder of the party is composed of details from various parts of England.

Bdr. Karl A. Walker

Bombardier Karl Walker is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Walker of this city. He enlisted in 1914 with the 23rd Battery C. E. F. and went overseas in February 1915. He was transferred to the 8th Battery and later volunteered for service in Russia and was accepted going to Northern Russia with the 67th Battery. He was wounded on November 11th, 1918. Gnr. Walker is a well known athlete of this city being well known as a wrestler and ball player. He is expected home this evening.

Pte. Basil V. Minue

Pte. Basil Minue is a son of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Minue of this city. He enlisted and went overseas with the Army Medical Corps in 1916 and was wounded. Later he was transferred to the S. S. Araguaya and in all made about twenty seven trips across the ocean. Later he was attached to the staff of the Bushy Park Hospital in Middlesex, England. He is expected to arrive home this evening.

Pte. Dyson Wallace

Pte. Dyson Wallace son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Wallace of this city arrived home this morning. He enlisted and went overseas in 1918 with a draft of the 9th Siege Battery. He was later transferred to a Machine Gun Corps with which he served in France coming through his service without a wound. Prior to his enlistment he was principal of the Woodstock Grammar School.

Gnr. Charles Colwell, D.C.M.

Gnr. Charles Colwell D.C.M. went overseas with the 23rd Field Battery in February, 1915. He volunteered for service with the 67th Field Battery in Northern Russia and saw considerable service there. He was awarded D.C.M. for gallant conduct. He is a U.N.B.

RECRUITING HERE FOR R.N.W. MOUNTED POLICE

INSPECTOR LA NAUZE AND
SERGT. TRUNDLE HERE

Both Served Overseas as Officers in the Cavalry—Many Intending Recruits Have Applied.

Inspector C. D. LaNauze and Sergeant Trundle of the Royal North West Mounted Police arrived in the city on Saturday and are conducting a campaign for recruits here with offices at the Employment Agency of Canada Bureau York Street.

Applications Already Received

Already some six or seven applications have been received from men wishing to enlist with the R.N.W.M.P. but these have not as yet been accepted. The standards set for enlistment in the body is as follows, height minimum five feet eight inches, although several applicants have been accepted that are five feet six in height. The chest measurement is, minimum thirty five inches. Those applying for enlistment in this body must have a good moral character, and must be British subjects. They must be intelligent, active, able-bodied and thoroughly sound and must have recommendations vouching for their good character.

Served in the War

Inspector La Nauze stated that eighty recruits had been secured in Nova Scotia and twenty in St. John. These recruits consist mostly of returned men including officers and N. C. O.'s. This morning a very good class of men applied for enlistment and will be examined this afternoon. Both Inspector LaNauze and Sgt. Trundle served overseas, the former with the Fort Geary Horse as a Lieutenant and the latter with the 3rd Hussars of the Imperial Army as a Captain.

With Police in Arctic Regions

Prior to his enlistment with the C. E. F. Inspector La Nauze was attached to the R.N.W.M.P. and had just returned from a trip to the Eskimo regions in the Arctic when appointed to the C. E. F. He was in charge of a platoon which was sent after two Eskimos who had murdered two priests in the far north. He with his platoon of two men set out from Great Bear Lake in 1915 crossed the Barren Lands and finally arrived at Coronation Gulf. They spent two years with the Eskimo and got along well with the aid of an interpreter. They made inquiries and found out the two Eskimos who had committed the murder and mused back to their headquarters with the prisoners. In all they were gone some two and a half years.

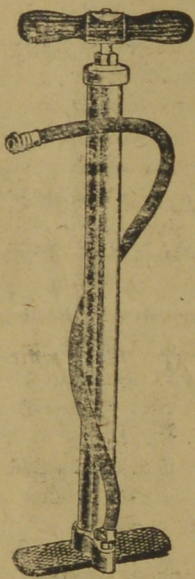
