WAYS TO USE GRAPES.

Grape Sherbet.

One cup of sugar, 1 cup of water, 1 easpoon of gelatine, 2 tablespoons of water, 1 cup grape juice, juice of 1 lemon. Boil the sugar and water five minutes. Soak the gelatine in cold water 5 minutes and add to the syrup, add fruit juice, cool and freeze.

Serve in glasses with or without whipped cream garnishing.

Grape Jelly.

One-half box of gelatine, half cup of grape juice, two and a half cups of boiling water, quarter cup of strained lemon juice, three-quarters cup of sugar and two large bananas.

Soak the gelatine in the grape juice five minutes. Dissolve in boiling water, Then add lemon juice and sugar. When jelly begins to stiffen, beat with egg beater and add the bananas pressed through a sieve.

One pint grape juice, juice of one lemon, one pint water, two cups of sugar. Boil the water and sugar together for five minutes; cool and add the grape and lemon juice. Freeze to a mush. Serve in tall glasses with sweetened whipped cream on top. Spiced Grapes.

Seven pounds of grapes, 4 pounds of sugar, 1 quart of vinegar, 1 tablespoon of ground cloves, 2 tablespoons of ground cinnamon


