Paid Fine for Violation

At Blackville recently Liquor Sub-Inspector Fraser D. Saunders raided the home of a Blackville man and found a quantity of liquor under the floor. A charge was laid and the man was fined \$75 and costs. The offender at one time was a vendor on the North Shore under the Scott Act and is known to be a habitual violator. A case against him is at present being heard at Chatham where he is charged with having liquor for sale.

Potato Crop Reduced

General reduction of the New Brunswick potato crop is reported as a result of rot in the late varieties. Forty to fifty per cent of the crop is affected. Earlier varieties escaped because dug some time ago but the rot which came later than usual has greatly decreased the crop now being dug. Mr. E. P. Bradt, Deputy Minister of Agriculture has been informed that buyers at Woodstock are paying two dollars per barrel for Irish Cobblers but will not touch Green Mountains.

Cupid Defies H. C. L.

Sussex Record: That the high cost of living has no terrors where cupid holds sway was clearly evidenced by the phenomenal number of marriages which took place in the month of September in Kings County. One Sussex clergyman told a Record representative that he had officiated at eleven weddings last month, and that this number usually constituted an average year's duties along that line. September 1919 was surely a record breaker for brides.

A Good Yield

Chatham Commercial: The potato yield this season is reported to be exceptionally good, and if the yield reported by a local man is any indication of general conditions, the crop should be a bumper one. John A. Irving accompanied by a couple of friends while inspecting his tuber crop one day recently established a record which will be hard to beat. Three stalks were examined which yielded a total of 106 potatoes—24, 50, and 32 respectively. Some of the spuds were necessarily small, but all were sound and well formed.

CHARGE AGAINST CHIEF FINLEY TO BE INVESTIGATED

Developments have been delayed in the matter but it is understood that both parties, the Chief and Mr. Blair are prepared to take action in the Police Court, as well as have the matter before the Police Commission.

ONE YEAR'S EXEMPTION FOR THE VETS

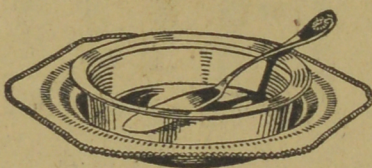
The Appeals and Contingencies

REAL ESTATE BOOM IN CITY THIS YEAR

TRANSFERS MORE THAN
IN ANY PREVIOUS PERIOD

Value Runs Into Hundreds of
Thousands—Forerunner of
Greater Activity in
Building.

Fredericton has experienced what is probably the greatest real estate boom in its history during the past few months and the curious part of the "boom" is that it has been so steady and gradual that it has hardly been realized. It is expected that it is the introduction to a period of activity which will be much more noticeable a year hence.

Greater Than Ever Before

Since July 1st upwards of seventy real estate transfers have been recorded in this city with the aggregate value running into the hundreds of thousands of dollars. During the corresponding period of ordinary years such transfers did not number one third of that number. Real estate activity is the result of increased population, building, particularly of residences, not having kept pace with the influx of people. The unsettled state of the building trades and of cost of materials entering into the construction of dwellings prevented many citizens from erecting buildings last summer but it is expected that next summer building operations will be undertaken which were delayed this season.

Delayed Building Activity

In spite of the unsettled conditions which retarded or prevented building in the residential districts, building operations in the business section of the city were carried on to a considerable extent although they began late in the summer. The aggregate capital invested in these new buildings for commercial purposes is well over \$100,000. There are prospects that the construction of new commercial buildings will continue next year as the demand for buildings in the business section will increase.
