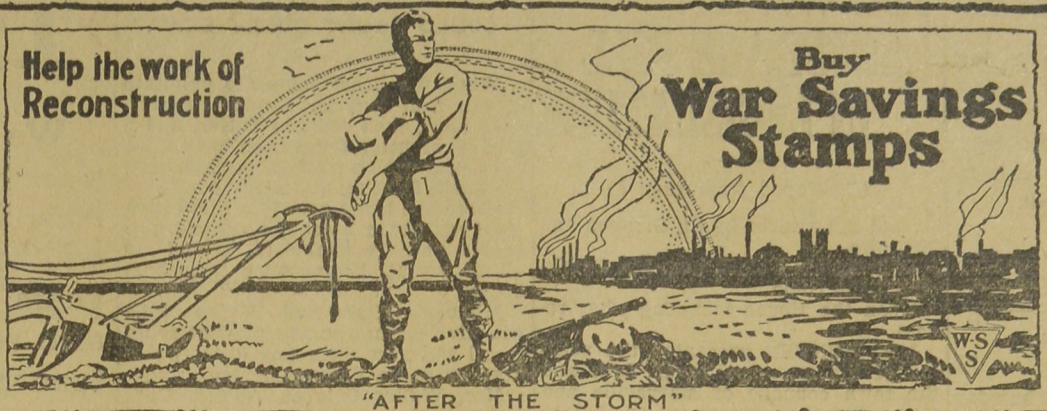

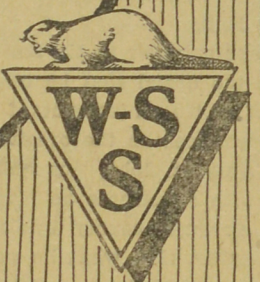

## DISPOSAL OF LIQUORS SEIZED UNDER THE ACT

Large Quantities of Joy Water Gathered in Last Year by Inspector Wilson and His Staff—Much of it was Turned Over to Hospitals—Canadian Drug Company Made a Big Purchase.

The reply of the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer to Mr. Dickson as to the disposition of liquors seized under the Intoxicating Liquor Act was as follows:  
HON. MR. MURRAY, in reply to Mr. Dickson:

## TO MAKE USE OF THE PORT OF PORTLAND

Portland, Maine, March 19.—A decision to bring to this port from overseas all the wounded of the Canadian armies, about 20,000 men, was announced today by Major General Frothingham, director general of the Canadian military service. He came here to take charge of the arrangements for their battalion.

The steamer Araguaia will bring the third detachment of wounded to arrive here some time this week.
