SPEED UP EGG PRODUCTION
IN THE EARLY WINTER

Electric Lights Have been Used in Poultry Houses to Good Advantage—Important Tests Made at Cornell University—The Domestic Fowl a Product of Tropical Countries, Where Days and Nights are of Equal Length.

Electric light can never take the place of daylight where the latter can be had; but it is a very useful substitute where occasion requires. There is every indication that electric light has come to stay and that its uses and advantages will increase as time goes by.

One of the comparative recent discoveries in this connection is the fact that the lengthening of nominal daytime by the aid of electric light will increase egg production to a considerable extent.

This paper has made mention of this frequently and published reports of Canadian tests. Some extensive work has been done at Cornell University, details of which are given in the columns of The Country Gentleman.

Tests at Cornell, as well as surveys of many flocks scattered through New York State and elsewhere have proved beyond all doubt that not only egg yield but net profits have been greatly increased. Accurate records on 100 S. C. White Leghorn hens and pullets in equal numbers showed that for a period of forty-eight weeks the net gain in production was 135.37 dozen eggs which represented a gain in value of \$71.88. With these birds lights were used from twilight to nine p. m. The gain in production lasted from November twenty-eighth through the winter until March nineteenth. There was a decrease in production from March twentieth to August sixth. From August to November there was a gain by the flocks under lights. The total gain of the birds under artificial light as compared with the birds without lights was 212.90 dozens against a loss of 77.53 dozens, leaving the net gain of 135.37 dozens. Very much larger gains have been secured for several months in succession on private flocks.

"The fact of the beneficial influence of the lengthened day is beyond dispute. Now what are the principles and factors producing this result?"

A Tropical Product

"The domestic fowl by nature, is an inhabitant of a tropical country, born and brought up for centuries upon centuries in the neighborhood of the equator where the nights and the days are equal—twelve hours long the year round. The hen was built for that kind of climate. Her digestive tract and her reproductive system were put together to fit that tropical condition. When man discovered these hens, he brought them into the north, temperate zone as unwilling captives, placed them in an entirely different environment and told them to "go to it"—to use a slang expression; and they did—in their own way. Instead of changing their nature to fit the new conditions, they changed their habits, which was the most natural thing to do. When the long cold nights and short days of the fall and winter came on, they simply tucked their heads under their wings and waited until spring should come. They ceased laying and saved their energies to keep warm. Instead of changing the length of their intestines or the size of the feed chopper—the crop—or gizzard in order to meet a fifteen or seventeen hour night, they simply hibernated—that's all. They did exactly as the woodchucks do. That is, until they reached the environmental conditions in the north that were comparable to the original conditions in the tropics, these birds simply followed the natural course of events and the line of least resistance and rested.

"It would seem therefore, that the real purpose of artificial light is to enable the fowls to eat when they can use the feed to best advantage in making eggs. It equalizes the time between meals as the hens' normal habits require.

Make Hens Happy

"One may say this is an imposition on the hens. It would not be an imposition to carry them back to the place which they are naturally fitted for, near the equator, where the nights and days are of equal length. It is not an unkindness to hens to let them have something to eat when they get hungry, about three o'clock in the morning. During the long nights they get cold and hungry four or five hours before the normal feeding time the next day. By shortening the nights with lights we can keep them happy. The happiest hen in the world is the laying hen, and anything that you can

do to keep the hen's digestive tract working normally will help to keep her happy and productive.

"When lights are used properly, hens will lay more eggs in a year than they otherwise would. They will lay a larger proportion of eggs when they are high-priced and they will keep in better health as a result of distributing their egg production more uniformly throughout the twelve months instead of massing their production and overdoing it in a very few months of the year. There is danger in the abuse of this method of control. It is like dynamite and must be handled properly.

Terms on which the recent theatrical strike was settled were ratified today at a meeting of the Actors' Equity Association.

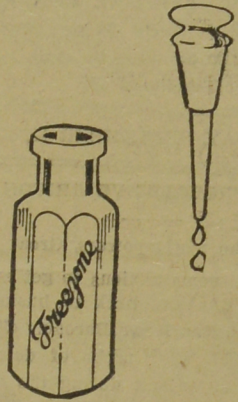
