## BLOODSHED AND RIOTING IN BOSTON POLICE STRIKE

**4,500 State Troops Vainly Strive to Maintain Order When "Bobbies" Go Out—One Man Dead and Several Injured in Shooting Affrays at the Hub—Winnipeg Strike Leaders Released on Bail.**

Boston, Mass., Sept. 10.—One man is dead, two men and a woman have been shot and a police captain was accidentally shot today as a result of rioting attending the strike of the police of this city. Mobs have looted stores of property valued at more than \$200,000 and the work continues tonight, though with less violence as regiments of state troops numbering about 4,500 men have been called out to police the city. They went on guard tonight about 7 o'clock and found they had a hard time of it handling the crowds and the greatest difficulty was in Scollay Square, the scene of recruiting rallies in war days. It was at this point that the man was shot and killed and the woman shot in the right arm.

#### Martial Law Not Declared

Brigadier-General Samuel D. Parker has taken charge of the armed forces and has established his headquarters at police headquarters. Mayor Peters has again called on the citizens to preserve order but has not declared martial law.

Unruly crowds are walking the streets tonight, breaking windows, starting incipient fires and making a lot of minor trouble for the State Guardsmen on duty. This afternoon fifty-seven members of the Metropolitan Park police refused to take the places of the striking policemen and were suspended. There is grave danger that the firemen of the city will go out in sympathy with the police. Fire Commissioner Murphy has been assured that the State Guard will man the land forces of the fire department in the event of a sympathetic strike and the Navy Department says it will man the fire boats.

Governor Coolidge, early today ordered the Fourteenth and Twentieth Regiments of the State Guard to join the four regiments of Guardsmen previously called out to police the city.

Governor Coolidge notified Mayor Peters early tonight that he was ready to ask President Wilson to send Federal troops to aid in policing the city if the mayor should make such a request.

The Adjutant-General said he expected both the Fourteenth Regiment from Bedford and the Twentieth from the West, to report here by midnight. Gangs of gamblers who have infested Boston, since last night, were broken up at the point of the bayonet by a company of State Guardsmen tonight. There were fifteen dice games in progress with about two thousand participants and spectators when the troops arrived.

Later a troop of State Guard cavalry dashing at full speed in company front with drawn sabres, clearing Scollay and Adams squares of thousands, who had jammed those places since early

today. Both squares had been the scenes of intermittent rioting.

#### Order Troops From Worcester

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 10.—Companies A, C and H of the Twentieth Regiment, State Guard of Worcester, and K Company of Fitchburg, were mobilized tonight and will leave for Boston at 11 o'clock.

#### Strike Leaders Released

Winnipeg, Sept. 10.—After twenty-six days incarceration the eight strike leaders who have been held in the provincial jail pending their trial on charges of seditious conspiracy were, at 5.20 p. m. today, in judges chambers granted bail. Chief Justice Mathers, who, together with Mr. Justice MacDonald and Mr. Justice Metcalfe, heard the arguments of counsel, read the decision of the court.

Bail was granted in the sum of \$4,000 each and two sureties of \$2,000 each.

The court found that it had not been proven that the accused would not appear to stand their trial and the decision went on to state:

"The court would not be justified in refusing bail on the grounds that public safety might be endangered by permitting the accused to be at large.

The decision as read by Chief Justice Mathers:

"Because of the great public interest involved in the prosecution and because bail has once been refused by a brother judge I asked by brothers, MacDonald and Metcalfe, to sit with me while hearing this application and had the satisfaction of knowing that both concurred with me in the views here expressed.

"I therefore order that the accused be admitted to bail in the sum of \$4,000 each and two securities of \$2,000."

## A MUSICAL FARCE THAT IS REALLY FUNNY

You can imagine some of the complications arising from the above circumstances. It is to laugh and audiences never fail to do so unrestrainedly.

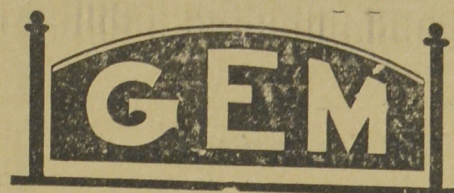
