

ACKNOWLEDGED BIGAMY CHARGE IN POLICE COURT

**WILLIAM G. SIMMONS
REMAINED FOR SENTENCE**

**Returned Soldier With Wife
and Child in England Made
No Defence—Married
Girl Here.**

William Simmons, the returned soldier who was charged with bigamy appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick yesterday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. The charge against him was read and he elected to be tried forthwith by Magistrate Limerick, pleading guilty to bigamy. He was remanded until Wednesday, September the sixteenth for sentence.

Simmons is a returned soldier having seen considerable service overseas. He returned to this country about the latter part of 1918. In May of 1919 he married a Miss Armstrong, daughter of Mrs. Agnes M. Armstrong who resides in York Street in this city. After living with her some time the girl's mother through inquiries she set forth ascertained that while on a five or six weeks' pass to England Simmons had married an English girl and that later a child had been born to them. The case was immediately reported to the Police Magistrate and he was arrested and appeared charged with bigamy on Saturday last. He was remanded until Wednesday by the Magistrate for a hearing and on appearing yesterday he acknowledged the offence and elected to be tried forthwith. He was finally remanded until Wednesday, Sept. 16th for sentence.

May Be Severe

Then sentence may be a severe one as the offence under the statute calls for a sentence not exceeding seven years' imprisonment.
