MR. DEWART RAPS THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

Says His Honor in Looking About for a New Premier Should Consult the Leader of the Liberal Party—People Will No Longer Tolerate the Hearst Administration—Says Opposition Forces Should Get Together.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 21—H. Hartley Dewart, K. C., Liberal leader in Ontario, handed out a statement this afternoon in which he rapped the lieutenant-governor Sir John Hendrie for having intimidated to the evening newspapers here that His Honor "believed that under the circumstances he could call anyone in the House or out of it and ask him to form a government." Mr. Dewart stated that the person to whom the lieutenant-governor should look to form a government is himself, "the successful leader of the Liberal party

Dewart's Statement

Mr. Dewart's statement follows: "The election returns clearly demonstrate that the people of the province of Ontario will no longer tolerate the Hearst administration. My advice is that there will be a larger Liberal contingent of members than in the past legislature. And with the U. F. O. numerically in the lead, its quite apparent that the Conservatives will not have as many members as the Liberals, and therefore have no representative to continue the business of the country.

"When the House dissolved there were just two parties in the House. The Hearst administration has been overwhelmingly beaten, and the principles that the Liberal party has fought for been vindicated by the election of a controlling group of Liberals, Soldiers, Farmers and Labor representatives. The principals of their policies they hold largely in common. There can be no reason why they should not get together. They have the same object in view—the accomplishment of sound, progressive and democratic government for the province. The problem is one that should not be difficult of solution.

"It is rather easy for the lieutenant-governor in an inspired interview to suggest where he will look for a leader or how he will deal with the situation. His natural course is to call upon the successful leader of the Liberal party to form a government. It will be time enough to discuss the question of an outsider when it appears it will be impossible for the groups to get to-

gether in the common cause of establishing popular government.

"The people of the province of Ontario are not in the humor to tolerate any further manipulation of the business of government, no matter what source it comes from."

Will Carry On

I shall certainly carry on until a new Ontario government is formed," said Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro-Electric Commission, in an interview here today. "What I shall do after that I cannot say."

Sir Adam was asked what his attitude would be in the event of his being called upon to form a government and thus succeed to the premiership of the province. He declined to commit himself.

Premier Hearst will arrive from the Soo tomorrow morning and a cabinet meeting has been called for the afternoon to consider the extraordinary situation arising. The government as at present constituted has power to continue in office until dismissed by the lieutenant-governor or by legislature at its next session. The customary procedure, however, when a government meets defeat at the polls, is for it to resign within a very few weeks.

Dry Two to One

Referendum figures published by the Ontario referendum committee tonight show that the province is going "dry" by more than a two to one vote of the people and that Toronto voted "No" on all four questions.

Beck as Leader

Brantford, Ont. Oct. 21—Sir Adam Beck as the leader of a joint U. F. O. coalition which would attract sufficient Liberals to give a working majority. Such is the personal suggestion of Mayor McBride elected to the legislature yesterday, who was on the I. L. P. ticket as a way of settling the apparent deadlock in the Ontario legislature.

In Ottawa

Ottawa, Oct. 21—There has been great excitement in the house over the vote in Ontario and Hon. Mr. Rowell looked and acted extremely disappointed at the result. The opposition has been getting considerable comfort over a prediction by a member of the government that the defeat of Hearst foreshadows the defeat of the Union government, but political events do not seem to have much significance now-a-days. The large vote polled in Ontario by labor and the independent farmers would seem to justify the expectation of old politicians that the politics of Canada generally will be a rather conglomerate affair for some years, with a great mixture of rather discordant elements and uncertainty as to results.

LITTLE HOPE OF AVERTING COAL STRIKE

Washington, Oct. 22—There was little hope of averting by government mediation the strike of bituminous coal miners set for November 1st when representatives of the miners and operators resumed today their joint conference with Secretary of Labor Wilson. Both sides stood firm overnight, the miners refusing to waive any of their demands while operators reiterated that it would be impossible to enter into negotiations in the face of the strike order which the Union announced would not be withdrawn.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET TODAY

New York, Oct. 22.—Oils were buoyant at the excited opening of today's stock market, leaders of that division making new high records. Texas Co. was the chief feature, its first quotation of 315 representing an overnight gain of 14 points. Within the first half hour advances of 2 to 8 points were made by Mexican and Pan-American petroleum, general motors, Baldwin and American locomotives and retail stores. Steels were 1 to 1½ points higher and leather, food and shipping issues averaged similar gains. Rails and metals were uncertain.
