## OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

CARE OF CLOTHES.

No Matter How Expensive They Will Not Look Good Long Unless Well Kept.

Here are a few "do's" for the girl who has a limited dress allowance to begin with and who wants to make the most of what she spends for it.

Do brush all garments thoroughly when you take them off.

And do hang them properly; coats on hangers, skirts on hangers, or by their loops.

Hats should be carefully brushed and boxed.

Gloves should be carefully stripped from the hands, smoothed and laid away in the glove box.

Blouses should be put on hangers, too.

And do "tree" your shoes.

Now there are some other finer points in the care of one's clothes that maybe everybody doesn't know. For instance there are careful and careless ways of seating oneself with regard to minimizing wrinkles that will occur in coats and skirts.

Aside from the awkward aspect of flopping into a chair or curling one's self up in it, the clothes one wears at the time are bound to show rather unsightly results. Sit easily and like a "lady" then if you want to keep your skirts comparatively flat.

The business girl who must sit for long in a skirt or dress will do well to provide her chair with an inconspicuous dark pad of fabric to provide against the discouraging "shine."

As to the matter of brushing, it may be done incorrectly too. Only the softest and silkiest of brushes should touch velvet or velour. Both, though, are decidedly better off for a self-brushing; that is velour on velour and velvet on velvet.

Constance vigilance in those small matters make for the longer and the better looking life of clothes.

## STORING THE OIL HEATER.

Now that spring is actually here, the oil heating stove can be put away. The question arises. How are they best stored?

First of all store an oil stove in a dry place. In an upper room, preferably; never in a cellar. Wrap thoroughly in burlap. To keep the nickel bright and shiny heat some paraffine wax and while in liquid condition take a brush and cover all the nickel parts with a thin coating.

To keep reservoir and burner from rusting, rub with linseed oil. See that the wick is taken out of the burner and that all parts of the burner are thoroughly cleaned before setting aside for the summer. Never allow oil to stay in the reservoir of the stove when it is not in use for any length of time.

## HEAT LEMONS.

When using lemons heat them first thoroughly in the oven. You will be surprised to see how much more juice there will be than when they are not heated.

When making pies, grate the yellow outside off before heating.

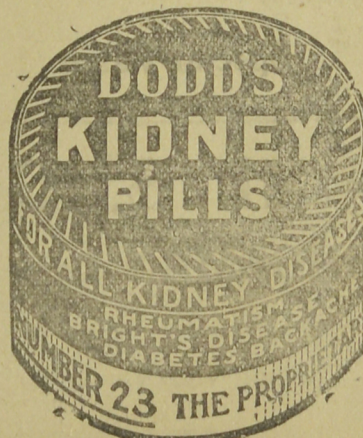
Lemons may be kept for some time if put in a glass jar filled with water and sealed. Keep in cold place.

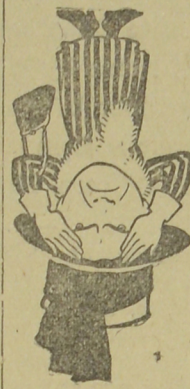
