

## PLAYGROUND DRIVE TO BE HELD IN MAY

### FUNDS NEEDED TO PROVIDE SUPERVISOR

Negotiations on for Portion of  
Trotting Park for a Play-  
ground—Committee  
Held Meeting.

The initial meeting of the Playground Committee was held at the mayor's office in the City Hall last evening with the following members in attendance: Mayor Hanson, Ald. Wilkinson, Ald. Cooper, Judge Limerick, Messrs. A. J. Wheeler, W. E. McMullen and W. R. Belyea. The meeting opened with Ald. T. S. Wilkinson in the chair. Mr. W. R. Belyea acted as Secretary.

After a considerable discussion it was decided by the committee that Queen's Park could not be secured by the committee for a playground during the coming year and that other grounds would have to be secured to serve the purpose. A committee of two, Judge Limerick and A. J. Wheeler, was appointed to interview the Fredericton Park Association with a view to renting the race course grounds for athletic purposes during the coming year. The committee was further empowered to put the grounds in condition as soon as some satisfactory arrangement had been reached with the Park Association. It was the opinion of the meeting that eventually some portion of Queen's Park would be developed as a playground for the younger children.

#### Meeting This Evening

A meeting of the boys of the city is called at the Parish House this evening for the purpose of organizing for a drive for funds to procure a supervisor. It has been suggested that the drive will begin the latter part of May after the Red Triangle Drive is finished.

Six cars of the way-freight of the C. N. R. were derailed this morning about two miles north of Penniac by spreading rails. The train was moving slowly at the time and the cars broke away from the engine. One of the cars turned turtle and landed near the Nashwaak River while about one hundred feet of track was torn up. No one received injuries. The suburban train went out from this city this morning to bring in the passengers on the Newcastle express which was held up on the other side of the wreck. An auxiliary crew cleared the line and placed the derailed cars on the track again.

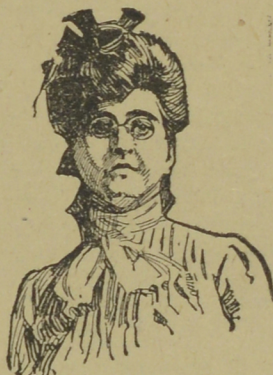
#### Reports of Officers

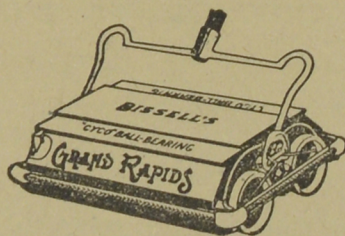

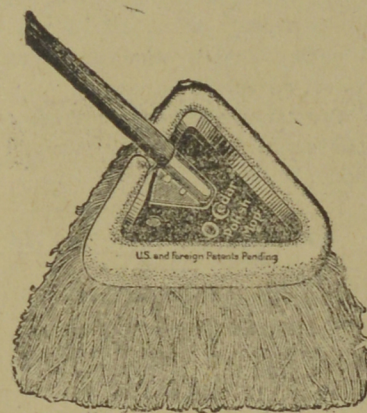
