#### HOW TO VOTE

The voter shall use the official bal-  
lot and shall strike out the words  
"For Daylight Saving" or the words  
"Against Daylight Saving," in accord-  
ance with his desire to vote against  
or for the same, as the case may be.

Not more than one elector shall at  
any one time enter the polling place,  
and such elector, upon entering, shall  
declare his name, surname and addi-  
tion, and if the name of such elector  
is found on the list of voters, he shall  
receive from the presiding officer an  
unmarked envelope, on the back of  
which the presiding officer shall write  
with a pencil of black lead or with pen  
and ink, his initials, in the presence of  
the voter.

The elector, on receiving the envel-  
ope, shall forthwith proceed within  
the screened compartment, and shall  
there, having marked his ballot, or  
having previously done so, replace his  
ballot within the envelope handed to  
him by the presiding officer, and shall,  
without any delay, hand the envelope  
containing his ballot, unsealed, to the  
presiding officer, who shall ascertain  
by examining his initials that it is the  
same with which he had furnished the  
voter, and if so satisfied shall immedi-  
ately and in the presence of the voter  
place the envelope containing the bal-  
lot in the ballot box, and the voter  
shall immediately leave the polling  
place. No such ballot shall be received  
by the presiding officer until the  
voter has proceeded to the screened  
compartment within the polling place,  
and while there placed his ballot in  
the envelope furnished him by the  
presiding officer.

The poll clerk shall, under the di-  
rection of the presiding officer, then  
enter the name of the voter on the  
check list.

## HOMING PIGEONS ARE BACK FROM SCENE OF THE WAR

One Thousand Returned to the United States on the Steamship  
Ohioan—Were in Charge of a Pittsburg Newspaper Man  
Who Has Been a Bird Fancier All His Life—Two of the  
Feathered Warriors Were Wounded—One to Receive  
the Distinguished Service Cross.

New York, April 20.—Including am-  
ong its members one badly mutilated  
bird which has been recommended for  
the Distinguished Service Cross, and  
another which lost an eye in battle,  
the first division of Uncle Sam's fea-  
thered warriors and scouts returned  
home on the steamship Ohioan.

They constitute about 1,000 homing  
pigeons in charge of Pigeon Company  
No. 1, one officer and twenty men,  
commanded by Capt. John L. Carney, a  
Pittsburg newspaper man and a vet-  
eran of the Spanish-American war and  
the Boxer uprising, who has been a  
bird fancier all his life.

The Ohioan was the first of five  
troopships due today bringing in ap-  
proximately 9,000 troops.

Pigeon Company No. 1 worked in  
connection with the Signal Corps and  
had a large number of pigeons. When  
an organization "went over the top"  
one of the soldiers carried, strapped  
to his back, a cage in which there was  
a homing pigeon, the last resort in the  
case lines of communication were  
broken.

Capt. Carney went over to France  
eighteen months ago with 3,000 hom-  
ing pigeons and with 300 officers and  
men, was attached to General Head-  
quarters under the command of Major-  
Gen. E. E. Russell, signal officer on  
the staff of Gen. Pershing. From Gen-  
eral Headquarters mobile units of six  
or seven men with birds and lofts  
were sent out to positions near the  
front lines, where they would get set-  
tled within five or six days.

#### Cher Ami Famous Bird

The most famous of the pigeons is  
"Cher Ami," which flew in one day  
with an important message and with  
a bullet wound on its breast and its  
right leg almost severed by a bullet.

"Cher Ami" was one of the first of  
the American pigeons to fly under  
battle conditions, and was also one  
of the nine pigeons which carried  
messages from Col. Whittlesey's "Lost  
Battalion" in the Argonne forest. In all  
she made twelve battle flights in the

Argonne. One day when she flew in,  
Sergeant Cockler noticed that some-  
thing was wrong and when the bird  
dropped into his hand he saw that its  
right leg was dangling, but it still car-  
ried the important message from up-  
per front. Gen. Russell recommended the  
bird for the D. S. C., and Gen. Persh-  
ing who heard of the instance, came  
out and stroked the head of the bird  
and told Capt. Carney to take good  
care of it on the way home. The bird  
will be taken to Washington.

#### "President Wilson" Lost Eye

"President Wilson" is the bird  
which had an eye shot out while mak-  
ing a flight, but continued on with its  
precious message. Another famous  
bird is "La Poflu," who was released  
from a tank during the St. Mihiel  
drive. The tank was far in front of the  
infantry and had seen an ammunition  
train. "La Poflu" carried back to the  
artillery the exact location of the am-  
munition train and the artillery did  
the rest.
