JUDGMENT OF THE COURT IN THE FLEMMING CASE

Decision of the Full Bench was Handed Down by Justice
Chandler and Concurred in by Chief Justice Hazen and
Justice Grimmer—The Case of the Province Against the
ex-Premier is Held to be Good.

Following is the full text of the
judgment of the Supreme Court in the
case of the King vs. Hon. J. K. Flem-
ming.

In this case objection has been taken
by the defendant under Order 25,
rule 2, to the statement of claim in the
action, on the ground that it does
not set forth a good cause of action,
other than the cause of action set out
in paragraph 29 of the statement of
claim, in which the plaintiff claims
for money had and received.

In my view this statement of claim
does set out two causes of action
other than that set out in paragraph
29, namely, the cause of action set
out in paragraphs 23, 24, 25 and 26,
and the cause of action set out in
paragraph 28 of the statement of
claim.

These paragraphs are as follows:

"23. The defendant while Premier
of the said province was in receipt
of a salary from His Majesty in right
of the said province, and while such
Premier in the year 1912 acted as
agent for His Majesty to arrange for
the appointment of a trustee under
the provisions of the said trust mort-
gage.

"24. The defendant as such agent
in the year 1912 arranged for the ap-
pointment of the said trust company
as such trustee, and in effecting such
arrangement secretly and corruptly
received for himself from the said
trust company a certain sum of mon-
ey as commission on the proceeds of
the said debenture stock, which was
deposited with the said trust com-
pany under the provisions of the said
trust mortgage.

"25. The amount of the said com-
mission is unknown to the plaintiff,
but the plaintiff alleges that it is the
sum of \$9,600.

"26. The defendant did not account
for or pay over to the plaintiff the
said sum so received by him from the
said trust company or any part there-
of.

"28. The defendant while premier
of the said province was in receipt
of a salary from His Majesty in right
of the said province, and while such
premier in the years 1911 and 1912
acted as agent for His Majesty to ne-
gotiate terms and arrange with the
Saint John and Quebec Railway Com-
pany for the making of a contract
between His Majesty in right of the
said province and the said railway
company. The defendant as such
agent in the years 1911 and 1912 did
negotiate terms and arrange with the
said railway company for the making
of the said contract, and in negoti-
ating such terms and in arranging for
the making of the said contract se-
cretly and corruptly received for him-
self from Arthur R. Gould, then presi-
dent of the said railway company, a
certain sum of money as commission.
The amount of such commission is
unknown to the plaintiff, but the
plaintiff alleges that it was the sum
of one hundred thousand dollars
(\$100,000). The defendant did not
account for or pay over to the plain-
tiff the said sum so received by him
from the said Arthur R. Gould, or any
part thereof, but has refused so to
do."

Under our present system of plead-
ing, it is not necessary in my view,
to allege matters which are strictly
matters of evidence nor is it neces-
sary for the plaintiff to set out how
the defendant is or was agent for His
Majesty with any greater particular-
ity than appears in the paragraphs
of the statement of claim quoted, but
it is sufficient to allege that the de-
fendant acted as agent for His Maj-
esty as in said paragraphs stated, and
that as such agent he received a
secret commission, as in the said
paragraphs alleged. See Odgers on

Pleading 7th edition, at page 106.
"Facts should be alleged as facts. It
is not necessary to state in the plead-
ings circumstances which merely tend
to prove the truth of the facts already
alleged."

See also Bullen and Lake, 7th edi-
tion, at page 56, giving a form of
claim against an agent for a secret
commission.

Paragraphs one to twenty-two of
the statement of claim while in my
view redundant and largely unneces-
sary may be considered as setting
out matters of inducement leading
up to the statement of the causes of
action set out in the remaining para-
graphs of the statement of claim.

I do not think that it is necessary
to consider nor deal with the provi-
sions of chapter 42 of the Act of
Assembly for the year 1918 upon which
so much time was expended on the
argument of this matter, to any great
extent, as in my opinion nothing ar-
ises with respect to this legislation, so
far as the objection taken by the de-
fendant to the statement of claim is
concerned. I do not think that the pro-


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CITY TO HOLD A CLEAN-UP WEEK; AND CITIZENS ARE PLEDGED TO AID

Chicago, June 7.—Over the top against trash! That is
the slogan that has been adopted in Chicago's own little war
scheduled for next week—the war against dirty streets, alleys,
yards and vacant lots. It is expected to be the biggest "clean
up" week in the history of the city. All civic organizations and
hundreds of thousands of persons are planning for the drive
against rubbish, dirt and filth that breed ugliness, disease and
death.

"Reports from all over the city indicate that the spring
clean-up will be a noteworthy one," said Dr. John Dill Robert-
son, commissioner of health. "Municipal cleanliness has a
vital relation to health. A cleaner Chicago means a healthier
and happier Chicago. Let's go over the top in the victory
bond drive, then let's get out the shovel and the rake and the
trash can and go after the litter all over the city. Yards should
be cleaned up, grass sown and gardens planted. Beautification
means encouraging the home spirit and that is fundamental
to good citizenship. Then the vacant lots should be tackled
and not be allowed to remain eyesores all over Chicago. The
health department will do everything in its power to aid in
the clean-up drive."

Promise has been made by the department of streets that
extra teams will be put on to haul away the accumulated trash
so that by Saturday every district should be pretty well cleaned
up. School teachers report that hundreds of children are
signing a pledge to devote three hours of hard work to clean
trash from their own yards and vacant lots near by; to make
war on cans, broken bottles and junk and help make a cleaner
and better city.
