

RECORD MONTH'S LUMBER CUT TO DECEMBER 15

ONE HUNDRED MILLION
FEET ON CROWN LANDS

Best Previous Month's Cut was
About Fifty Million Feet—
Record Season's Cut
Within Reach.

It is announced that during the month between November 15th and December 15th, over one hundred million feet of lumber had been cut on the Crown Lands of the Province according to the reports handed in by scalers. This is the heaviest cut ever recorded in one month, one of the largest previous being fifty million feet.

Some forty-four scalers and assistant scalers numbering in all about ninety have handed in their records and the Chief Scaler A. T. Murchie is busily engaged compiling the total.

The result obtained by a rough totalling produced complete surprise and there is little doubt that the total season will produce a cut which will be a record for some years past.

The whole statement of the cut will be given out by Chief Scaler Murchie as soon as the details have all been totalled. A total of three hundred million feet for the season has been forecasted and probably will be exceeded.

STEPHEN TAYLOR DIED YESTERDAY AT SHEFFIELD

ECCENTRIC PASSED
AWAY AT AGE OF 78

Skated Long Distances Even at an Advanced Age—Wrote Threatening Letters to Public Men.

Stephen B. Taylor died yesterday afternoon at his home in Sheffield, Sunbury County, at the age of seventy eight years. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Ellen Wasson, widow of Thomas Wasson who is seriously ill at the present time. The deceased and his sister lived together and both were taken with lagrippe a short time ago, the illness resulting fatally to the brother.

Noted as Eccentric.

The deceased for years has been noted as an eccentric. He was a man of more than average height with long flowing white hair and beard. His appearance was striking and his conduct also. Whenever the ice of the St. John River was in good condition, he would use skates as a means of travelling to and from Fredericton. Up to the present winter he skated, advancing age seeming to make no difference in his activity on skates.

Letters to Public Men.

During the greater part of his life, the deceased displayed a tendency to write letters to public men frequently abusive in nature. The late Hon. A. G. Blair was one of his especial targets, and in more recent years Sir J. D. Hazen was the object of attacks. Members of the Provincial Legislature also received threatening letters from Taylor. Federal departments at times were the objects of his violent attacks, the post office department particularly attracting his attention. One of his literary attacks on Sir J. D.
