DEATH OF EDWINA GRAY

(St. John Times)

In the death of Mrs. H. Price Webber, which occurred last week in Parrsboro, there passed away a lady who shared with her husband perhaps greater popularity in the eyes of the people of the maritime provinces than any other. Every town of any size in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and the eastern part of Maine has at some time or other within the last half century been entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Webber and their company of players.

Mrs. Webber, or Edwinna Gray as she was known on the stage, was a native of Augusta, Maine, and made her first appearance in St. John as the star in a company managed by Wilson & Clark, playing some of the old time popular sensational comedies.

At that time Price Webber who had come to this country from England as a boy, was a type setter with George W. Day, publisher of "The Humorist". He was actively connected with amateur minstrels.

It was not until after his marriage with Edwinna Gray, that Mr. Webber went into the professional theatricals forming the Boston Comedy Company which became one of the best known companies to the people of the lower provinces. They opened up their career in the old Mechanics' Institute in this city and from that time both Mr. and Mrs. Webber became known to almost every family in the lower provinces. From time to time the composition of their company changed, but it was always Price Webber's company and his visits to the various towns of the province were always looked forward to. In the early period of their career they played such productions as "Ten Nights in a Bar-Room", "Rip Van Winkle", "Flowers of the Forest," etc. "East Lynne" was a favorite bill.

Twice in their history the company's entire property, including wardrobe and scenery, was destroyed by fire, but each time no time was lost in getting the company outfitted and on the road again.

Two years ago Mr. and Mrs. Webber retired from the business and until this summer resided with Mr. and Mrs. Seaton at Fair Vale. They then went to Parrsboro, where Mr. Webber took over the management of the local theatre, and it was there that Mrs. Webber died.

Both enjoyed an enviable position of popularity and esteem amongst the play-going people of the lower provinces and the sympathy of a great many has gone out to Mr. Webber in his great loss.

The Daily Kennebec Journal of September 11 says:—

"The funeral of Mrs. H. Price Webber took place at 2.30 yesterday afternoon and was largely attended, from the home of her sister Miss Nellie Moore, 21 Sewall street. Beautiful flowers were strewn on the casket, loving tokens from family and friends. Services of the Episcopal Church were conducted by Rev. Victor O. Anderson rector of St. Mark's of which church Mrs. Webber had been a consistent and earnest member for many years. Interment was made in the family lot in Mt. Pleasant cemetery. The bearers were William H. Reid, Richard Toas, Charles T. Penney and John C. Arnold."

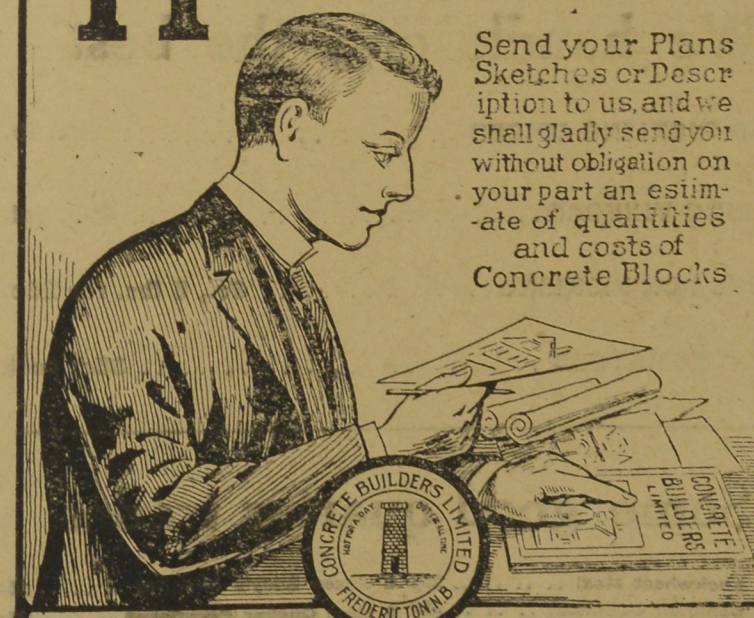
