

INSPECTORS WERE BUSY HERE LAST NIGHT

SOME \$550 PAID IN FINES
TODAY IN CONSEQUENCE

Several Drunks Arrested With
Liquor in Their Possession
—Two Circus Men
in a Fight.

The Fredericton police and liquor sub inspectors Herbert and Fraser Saunders and James Dickson of Chatham reaped a merry harvest in drunks last evening about \$550 being levied in fines and deposits. Four drunks with bottles were arrested one being let out on a \$200 deposit and the other three being fined \$8 each for drunkenness and \$100 each for violation of the Intoxicating Liquor Act of 1916. Three drunks were let out, two on \$8 deposits and one on an eight dollar fine. Two of the drunks with bottles were arrested in the trotting park and one at the exhibition entrance while the fourth was caught on York Street.

Boarding places and hotels were not the only places full to capacity last evening as was shown by this morning's police court records. Lying room was at a premium in the cells and some of the inmates had to spend the night in the corridor, although in no conditions to offer any objection.

Partners Had Mix-Up

Two of the circus men had a dispute on the grounds yesterday afternoon over a nine dollars' difference in their account and as both grabbed the money they chose to settle it outside on the advice of one of them. After getting outside the grounds on the way to the rear of the city where the dispute was settled the money was torn in two parts each contestant taking one. One hit the other in the mouth and they mixed things up. The Chief of Police was called to settle the dispute and arrested both the men. They appeared before Magistrate Limerick this morning and several witnesses were called. Both parties were found guilty of assault and disturbance and were fined \$25 each, being given till tonight to leave the city.

The motor truck responded to a still alarm sent in from the Phoenix Apartments about eight o'clock last evening. On the arrival at the apartments the fire was found to be all smoke.

One returned soldier S. M. Ritchie who recently qualified for the Forest Rangers' Examinations has been appointed Forest Ranger with headquarters at Hillsboro. This is the first appointment following the examinations recently held.

Attending to "Flu" Cases

Dr. J. A. Wade, D. M. H. O. is at Woodstock taking care of the "flu" cases which have been reported. Three cases are in the town and one in the Parish. All necessary precautions have been taken to prevent the spread of the disease.

Lewis Gallagher of St. John a returned soldier wheeled to this city on Wednesday from St. John in eight and a half hours. He left St. John at 7.30 arriving here at 4 p. m. Although the roads in some places were rough for wheeling he arrived without an accident.

THE 1919 EXHIBITION BIDS FAIR TO PUT ON NEW ATTENDANCE RECORD; ALL FIGURES EXCEEDED LAST NIGHT

General Half-Holiday Declared in the Schools and Some Mills and Factories—Great Influx of People from Outside Places Today—Judging is Almost Completed—Outdoor Free Attractions and the Midway Working Last Night.

There is every prospect of the Fredericton Exhibition of 1919 putting on an attendance record which will greatly surpass anything in the past. Up to last night the turnstiles had clicked after 18,226 persons and in 1915 the three day record was only 14,299. This gives the present fair a lead of about four thousand over the last. The recorded attendance for three days in 1915 and 1919 is as follows:

The rain of Tuesday night appears to have had no effect upon the attendance.

General Half-Holiday

Today is being observed as a general half-holiday. The schools of the city have a half-holiday although the pupils took one unofficially yesterday afternoon. The Hartt Shoe Factory also is down today and the employees of other plants also have the afternoon off.

The members of the office staffs of the various provincial departments also have a half-holiday.

Pike Attractions Very Popular

The "Pike" attractions which were in operation yesterday after some delay due to poor railway arrangements attracted huge crowds. "The Whip" which is making its bow as an amusement in this city did a great business.

Greatest Day's Attendance

Yesterday had the greatest day's attendance ever recorded at a Fredericton fair. Last night the Midway in all sections was thronged and the "fakers" who were putting up dolls on the games did a roaring business. So great was the crowd and its desire to stay on the grounds that there was some difficulty in getting it to move off when "God Save the King" was played. After a time the grounds were cleared.

Free Attractions

The troupe of female acrobats and pyramid builders showed on the big stage at the rear of the grounds and proved very interesting to the spectators.

Judging Almost Done

There has been rapid progress made in judging and the work is practically completed today.

There was keen competition in Ladies Work with many entries. Many local prize-winners were among the awards.

Sales Over \$50,000

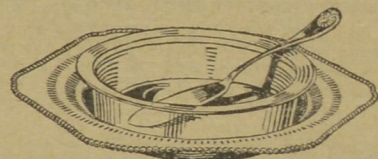
