cuse for frequent visits to the country store where the men folk gather to talk. It was something with a capital S this time. The minister's wife had triplets!

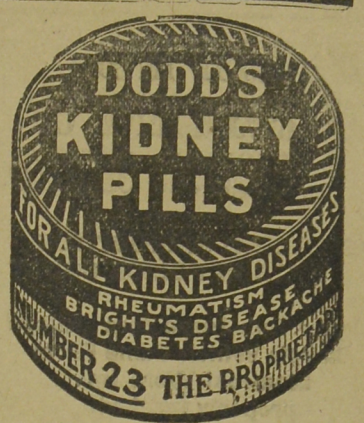
