## CARDINAL MERCIER GUEST OF QUEBEC CITY

Primate of Belgium Warmly Welcomed by People of the Ancient Capital—The City Bedecked With Flags in His Honor—An Address of Welcome Presented in Behalf of the Province—The Cardinal's Reply.

Quebec, Nov. 2.—His Eminence Cardinal Mercier primate of Belgium and one of the most heroic figures of the war, was the guest of the city of Quebec from early Saturday morning until he left this evening on board the steamer Megantic to return to Belgium.

The entire city was gaily bedecked with flags, the papal colors predominating in honor of the distinguished visitor, and as he arrived at the Union Station at 6.30 Saturday morning he was met by Mgr. Roy, auxiliary bishop of Quebec, Mayor Lavigneux, and other officials by whom he was escorted to the cardinal's palace.

He officiated at pontifical high mass at the basilica Saturday morning, the feast of All Saints and at the conclusion of the solemn service addresses of welcome were presented him by Canon Laflamme, pastor of the Basilica and by His Eminence Cardinal Begin, Archbishop of Quebec. The church was crowded with people who followed with deep attention the reply of Cardinal Mercier to the greetings of the clergy of Quebec.

At four o'clock on Saturday afternoon an official reception by the province and city of Quebec was extended to the distinguished prelate at the legislative buildings.

Long before the hour appointed the streets leading from the cardinal's palace to the legislative were crowded with the people, while a large throng of citizens assembled at the building where the reception was to be held. As Cardinal Mercier drove by, accompanied by Cardinal Begin, he was loudly acclaimed by the people and was also applauded to the echo when he entered the legislative council chamber where the combined welcome of the province and city were offered him.

#### Brilliant Scene

The scene was a brilliant one as the two prelates mounted the throne in their episcopal robes, surrounded by a guard of honor composed of Brig-Gen. Landry, officer commanding Military district No. 5, and most of the officers of the district. The spacious chamber was filled with prominent citizens and in the first seats on the right of the throne sat the chapter of canons, while immediately next to them were members of the Anglican clergy, including His Lordship the Bishop of Quebec, Very Rev. Dean Shreve, Rev. Canon Scott, the Venerable Archdeacon Balfour.

Cardinal Mercier and Cardinal Begin were conducted to the throne by Sir Lomer Gouin, who immediately read the address of welcome on behalf of the province and was followed by Mayor Lavigneux for the city of Quebec.

Cardinal Mercier delivered a ringing reply in the course of which he paid a signal tribute to the part Canada had played in the war and expressed gratitude for the help received from this country for the occupied territory of Belgium.

#### Tribute to Canada

Cardinal Mercier said he was very grateful for the kind words addressed him. After two months spent in perpetual movements in the United States it would seem that there had been reserved for him a day of rest and holiday in Quebec. On behalf of the Belgian nation, he said, he would like to express a word of gratitude. Here in Canada the people did not know how much their country was loved in Belgium. He said Canadians were in the

fight from the first hour, although Canada had nothing to gain politically or territorially—her sole object was to have right prevail over the brutal force which was bent on crushing civilization. It was the Canadian troops who had on one critical occasion saved the situation.

St. John High Had Better of Territory—Crease Made a Long Run—Downed by Back.

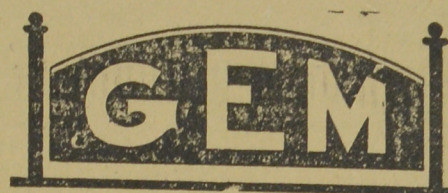
St. John November 5—Despite the fact that playing conditions were very bad, an interesting game of Rugby was played Saturday afternoon in the interscholastic league, when the St. John High school and Rothesay teams met. Neither team was able to score although the High school had somewhat the better of the play, forcing the Blue and White to touch for safety in the second period.

Much dribbling was in evidence, the ball being on the ground during most of the play. Quite a few fumbles were registered against the men, but were unavoidable under the circumstances. The St. John scrimmage seemed to be able to push Rothesay boys around pretty much at will, but their halves were unable to get started on account of the wet condition of the grounds. Towards the latter part of the second half, Rothesay by a series of kicks got the High School team back in its own territory. McCreedy, the Rothesay halfback, was conspicuous by his absence, being greatly missed in the lineup. He was injured in the game with Fredericton High last week, and could not play.

The most spectacular play of the game took place in the first half, when Crease for Rothesay got the ball and starting from the fifty yard line, broke through interference and started for the St. John line. He was overtaken by Knight on the twenty-five yard line who tackled him from behind, undoubtedly saving the game for St. John. Knight and Fraser starred for St. John the latter relieving the pressure several times by his timely and well placed punts. Crease and Teed shone for the Rothesay aggregation.
